Greenwood Upsets Mt. Zion 5-4 to Tighten League Race

Mt. Zion lost a golden opportunity to take over sole possession of first place in the Claremont Community League on Friday evening when they dropped a tight 5-4 decision to Greenwood. In the other game, Altona drubbed Claremont 12-4.

Whirlwind righthander Neil Pascoe literally won his own ball game on Friday, romping home with the game-winning run in his team's final turn at the plate. The upset victory moved Greenwood into a fourth place position, only two points behind Altona. They have a game in hand.

Mt. Zion moved out front in the first inning 1-0 as the Greenwood twirler appeared slightly wild in the contest's early stages. Grant Carson rounded the sacks for the defending champ's initial tally. Lorne Disney completed the circuit in the second to give Mt. Zion a two run advantage.

In the third, Greenwood bunched together three hits, an error and a walk to push four runs across the plate. Neil Pascoe's double with the bases loaded pushed three mates in to score and Richard's infield roller counted another tally. Runs scored by Grant Jones and Kaye Evans in the fifth for Mt. Zion put both clubs back on even terms.

In the seventh, Neil Pascoe reached first and later scored on Richard's single to win the game. Greenwood stranded seven runners while Mt. Zion left six aboard.

Altona 12, Claremont 4
The luckless Claremont team continued their winless streak on Friday when they bowed to Altona by a 1-sided score of 12-4. Bruce Redshaw started on the mound for Claremont with Bill Townner working in relief. Murray McDowell went the route on the hill for Ray Hill's squad.

Redshaw lacked control in the early innings and issued five free passes in Altona's initial turn at bat. A single by Dean Watson and an error on Grant Drewery added to the righthander's troubles. Claremont counted a single tally in the first. Doug Allman singled and later scored on a fielder's choice.

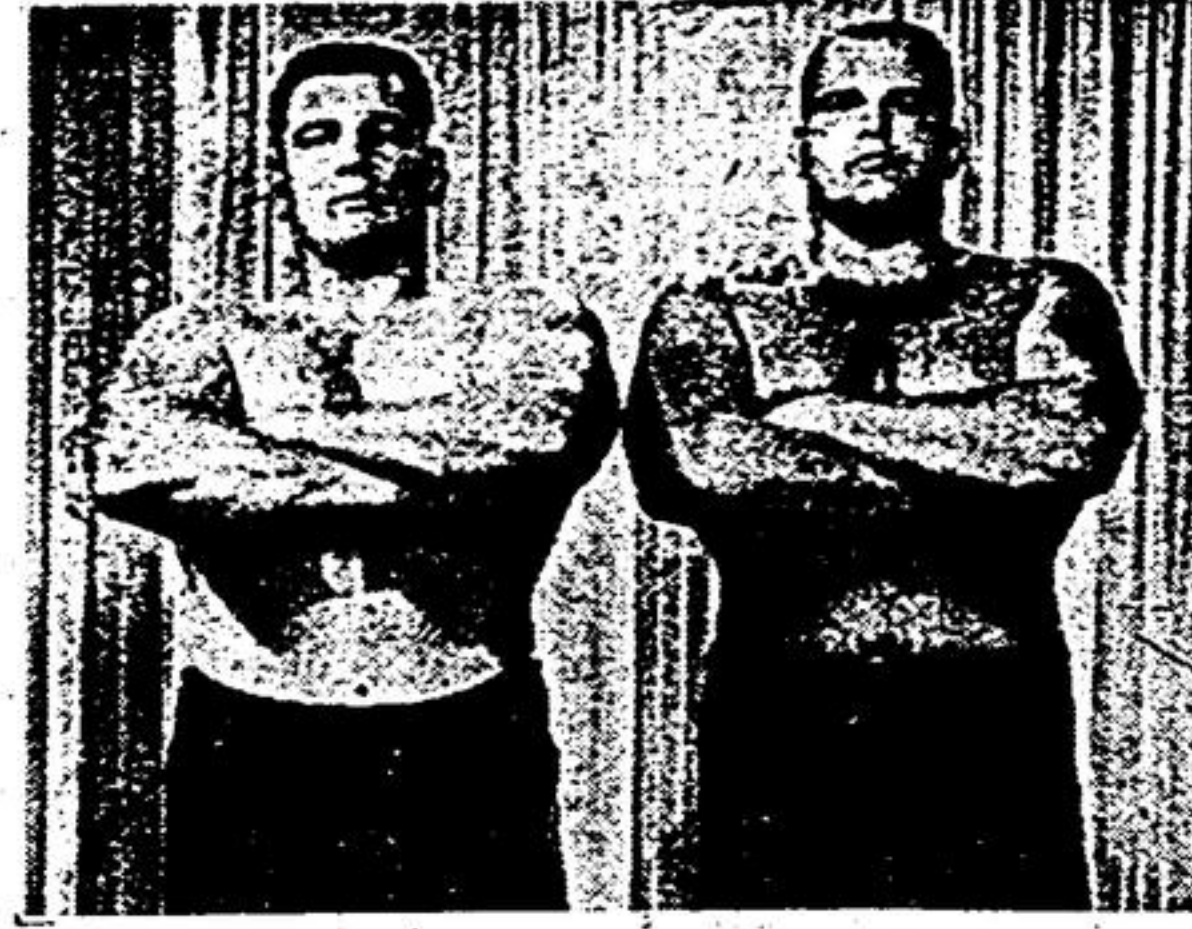
PRINCE MAIAVA IN TAG TEAM MATCH
