

Planning Board Seeks To Take Mill St. Homes From Industrial Zone

Stouffville Planning Board is seeking to take the residences on the west side of Mill Street, which are now in an industrial zone, out of this zone and back into residential property.

All the residential lots on the west side of Mill St. were placed in this industrial area some two years ago at the insistence of the Metro Planning Board.

Now that a change is to be made, all these residents affected by the change will be notified by mail of the move and will be given a chance to object at a meeting of the Planning Board on July 11th.

The local Board conferred for a full afternoon on Friday with representatives of the Metro Planning Board on the text of the Zoning Bylaw which will shortly go to council for approval and to the Dept. of Planning & Development.

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Contracting For Shopping Centre

Twelve acres of land with 600 ft. frontage on the townline west of town, and owned by Cedar Pines Development, is to be developed into a shopping centre according to Chas. Magee, real estate developer. The exact location of the land is immediately west of the Jos. Sider home and lies in Whitechurch Township.

According to Mr. Magee, three store contracts have already been negotiated as well as a large chain grocery.

The land inside the corporation boundary lying from the White Rose Service Station to the Blue Sunoco, is within a town industrial zone. Land lying both north of the proposed Centre in Whitechurch, and land to the south in Markham has been purchased for development purposes.

Action Threatened for Sub-Dividers of Dickson's Hill Farm

Markham Township Council has received a recommendation from the Township Planning Board that they take action against the owners of the Herb Wideman farm at Dickson's Hill for alleged violation of the township's sub-division laws. According to a report before council on Monday afternoon, Messrs. Fenhill & Greenstein purchased the Wideman farm and sold the property in ten-acre blocks. However, in a remaining parcel of six acres they proceeded to subdivide without a plan. Council agreed that Planning Board should be supported in their recommendation.

Pipe Line The Board of Transport do not propose to hold any further public meetings in connection with the proposed route of the

Trans-Canada Pipe Line. The Board advised that all points had been covered in previous hearings and the Company given a permit.

They did state that if the Township had any complaint, they would desire to have the same made in writing. Solicitor Lucas pointed out that the township could only make a complaint in so far as the route affected the crossing of township roads and that they had no jurisdiction on the crossing of private lands.

Reeve Clark suggested that the Clerk and the township solicitor as well as chairman of the Planning Board have a meeting and draft a reply to the Transport Board setting forth the wishes of the township.

STORM DISRUPTS POWER HERE

During Saturday's windstorm, a big tree toppled on Albert St. near the terrace residences. A number of large limbs crashed to the ground, one of them near the Smith Apt., Church St., narrowly missing a parked car. Mr. Harold Murphy was not so fortunate, as falling timber at the Walter Atkinson place, eastend, did several hundred dollars damage to his car. A high tension line which broke on Victoria St. cut off power to a portion of the westend residential section at 4 o'clock. The line was finally restored by Markham Rural crewmen about 9 p.m. Three hundred persons were without power in Markham Twp., and the rural hydro crews found breakdowns almost equal to Hurricane Hazel.

A.H. Williams To Manage New Pool

Mr. A. H. "Andy" Williams has been appointed Manager of the new Stouffville Community swimming pool. His two assistants will be Messrs. Lorne Boadway and Bill Murphy. It is expected that the pool will be open by July 15th.



Stouffville Loses Million Dollar Plant to Aurora

The Sterling Drug Manufacturing Co. Ltd. will erect a million dollar factory project on Yonge St. within the Aurora south town limits. The firm had considered a site in Stouffville abutting the C.N.R. south of the Gold Fish Supply Co., and town officials spent some time conferring with R. V. Doty, Industrial Dept. of the Canadian National Railways, on the proposed site. Sewers, water and rail facilities were available as well as the twenty to thirty acres of land required.

However, the company made their final decision last week to go to Aurora where the same facilities are available plus Yonge St. frontage which many plants consider to be an advantage for advertising purposes. The big firm, which has been in Windsor for some seventy years, will employ four hundred persons at the outset. Had they decided to move to Stouffville, it would doubtless have advanced the development of this town ten years overnight. However, this was not to be, and it will be up to council and the Planning Board to seek further for industry.

ALF. LeMASURIER LOCAL REP. ON METRO BOARD

Mr. Alf. LeMasurier, former reeve of Markham Township, has been appointed to the Metro Planning Board. He will represent four separate municipalities, Markham Township, Markham Village, Stouffville and Richmond Hill. The recommendation must receive final approval from the Dept. of Municipal Affairs.

Markham Twp. was represented by Reeve Clarke, Councillors, Mrs. Kathleen James and Howard Cosburn; Stouffville by Reeve Daniels, Councillors Gar Lehman and Elgin Wagg; Markham Village by Reeve Fry and Councillor Hisey and Richmond Hill by Councillor Floyd Perkins. Each municipality was allowed two votes. Mr. A. G. Thompson of Stouffville and Mr. J. R. Scrimger of Richmond Hill were also nominated for the position. A second ballot was required when the first vote resulted in a tie. The appointment was made at a meeting at But-tonville on Thursday evening.

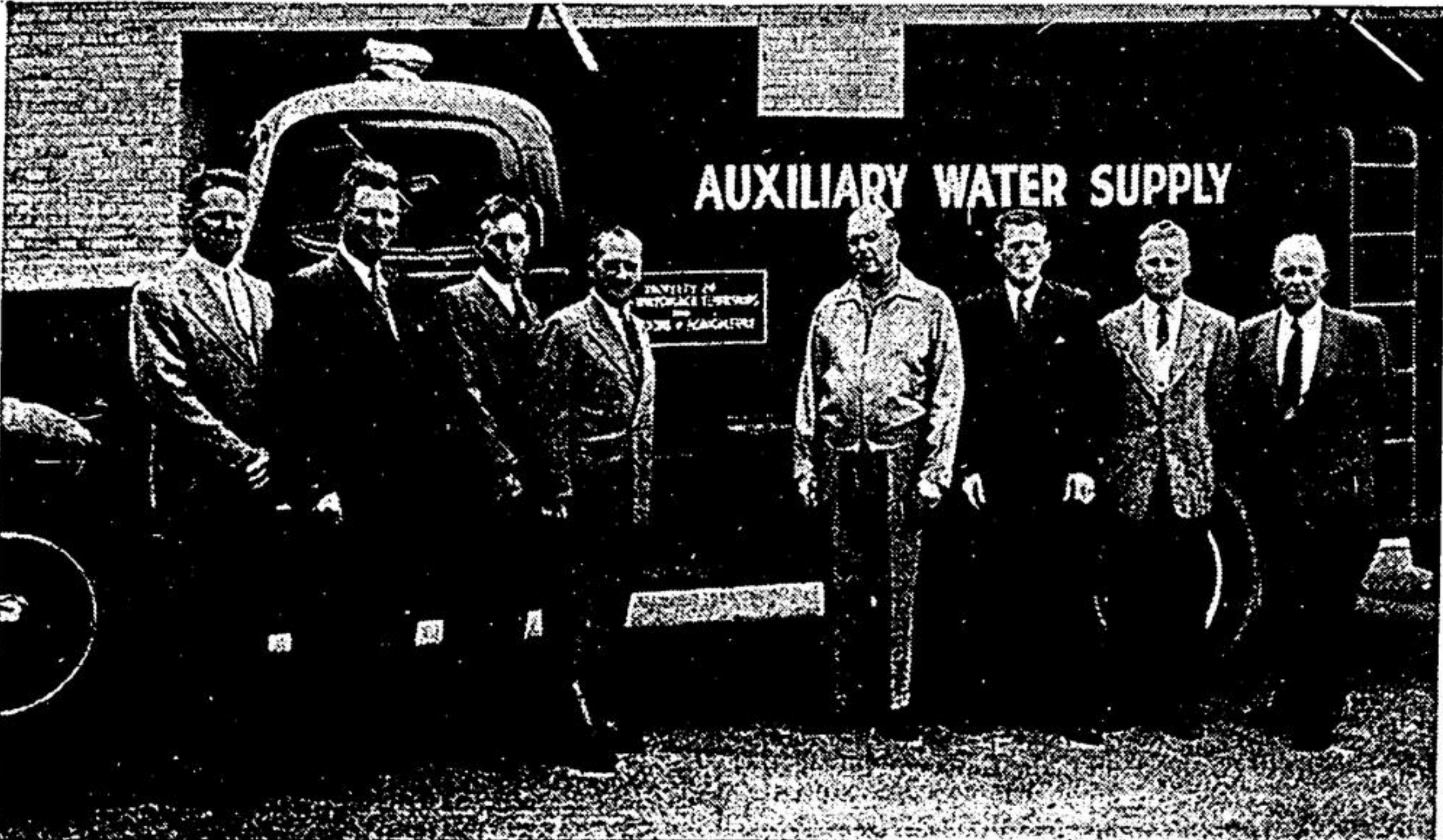
