BEER OUTLETS IN UXBRIDGE?
The Uxbridge Times Journal reports that Mayor Puteborough of Uxbridge made a surprise move last week when he introduced the subject of legal outlets for alcoholic beverages in the town. The Mayor contended that such outlets would bring much increased business to Ux-

bridge. He stated that council could, by a majority vote, pass a motion for application for a plebiscite without having a petition from the people.

The Mayor was strongly supported by councillor Hochberg and G. Coulter who presented the motion asking the Liquor Control Board to set a date for a plebiscite. The motion carried although opposed by councillor Lennox, Tipper and Reeve Ferguson.

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
