Big Wrestler Breaks Ring, Police Eject Two Spectators

Three hundred and twenty-five pounds of hurtling muscle wrenched Stouffville's wrestling ring off its moorings in Friday evening's main tag team match. The huge Miller brothers, tipping the scales at well over 300 pounds apiece, pounded the combination of Ronnie Acheson and Prince Maiava into submission before a large crowd of anti-Miller spectators.

The first round was only ten minutes old when one of the giant Miller brothers hurled his opponent, Ronnie Acheson into the ropes. The tension-tight strands stretched almost six feet into thin air and snapped two of the supports. Arena officials worked strenuously during the between-round intermission to repair the damage but their efforts proved fruitless.

Hardly had the ring been returned to its previous condition, when one of the bone-bending combatants slammed his opponent into the ropes, snapping the turn-buckle. Although the ring was in a rather precarious condition, the wrestlers finished their bout.

Although the powerful Millers lost the first round, they had a decided edge in the match. They quickly disposed of the Prince and his cohort in rounds two and three.

With the exception of round one, the Prince did very little in the ring. In rounds 2 and 3 the shaggy-haired Maiava was tossed around like a match-stick by the huge Millers. Acheson did not fare much better although he was subjected to a considerable amount of "dirty" treatment when the officials' back was turned.

For almost fifteen minutes of the first round, Ronnie Acheson was mauled by the combination of Ed and Bob Miller. While Prince Maiava stood help-

less in his corner, the Millers gouged, pulled, twisted and choked until their opponent, Acheson, was ready to be carried out of the ring in pieces. He did manage, however, to tag the Prince and with a toss of his mop-like mane, he was quickly into the fray. He delivered a couple of sharp judo-chops to Ed Miller's neck, then hammered his partner with his own rock-hard head, sending him limp to the canvas. A quick leg scissors ended the round.

Bass Fishing Season Opened on July 1st

Bass time is now open — and that, for thousands of fishermen and women, means action. For while it has been preceded by speckled trout and pickerel fishing, the large-mouth and smallmouth bass season stands first in the affections of all.

There are several reasons. First, perhaps, is the fact that bass is regarded as the gamest freshwater fish of all.

Next is the fact that he is found almost anywhere from the Great Lakes to the extreme north; from the eastern to the western boundaries of Ontario. His willingness to hit — at the right time — is proverbial. The pugnacious bronze-back will strike at almost any live bait, at almost any type of casting or spinning lure, at flies and bugs. He may be caught still-fishing, casting or just lazily trolling.

Many experts believe that, even if the bass isn't hungry, he will smash a lure out of sheer pugnacity. That is certainly the case in June when the fish are on the spawning beds, which is the reason the Department of Lands and Forests appeals to sportsmen to give the fish a chance. Where reasonable appeals fail, there are regulations to protect the fish until July 1 when the bass season opens in Ontario.

There isn't a great deal of difference between the largemouth and the smallmouth. They may be distinguished apart, however, by the fact the mouth of the largemouth fish extends beyond the eye.

Colour isn't much of an indication; both fish are dark green, ranging to brown or almost black, depending on the water in which they are found. Generally, however, the largemouth may be found in warmer waters than the other type and not infrequently they are larger. For instance the world's record largemouth, caught in Georgia where waters are warmer than in Ontario, is a 22 lb. 4 oz. fish. The largest small-mouth on record here weighed nine pounds two ounces and was caught in Nipissing County, Ont. However, the world's record fish weighed 14 pounds and was taken in Florida.

Despite tremendously increased fishing pressure, the bass is still doing well here. Given reasonable protection, a female bass will produce a family of 4,000 to 5,000 youngsters. In addition, the Department operates a number of bass hatcheries and recently has had marked success in transferring fish from lakes in which they were not doing too well because of overcrowding to other lakes which give them a better opportunity to grow and reproduce.

"CUP SERIES" SOCCER OPENS SAT.

All was quiet on the district soccer front over the past weekend. Due to the long holiday weekend, no games were scheduled for Saturday.

All the teams in the Newmarket and district soccer league will swing back into action in "cup series" first round play July 6.
