NO PLACE IN SPORT Tuesday evening's fistic free-for-all in the Stouffville - Agincourt baseball game at the park was certainly an inexcusable affair. A number of irresponsible Agincourt players were certainly the instigators of the ridiculous schmozzle. Their unsportsmanlike attack on plate official Len Buckland was without parallel in local baseball annals. Two wrongs do not make a right, however, and the influx of Stouffville players onto the diamond, only added fuel to the fire. A couple of fans who entered the fray, worsened the already serious situation. A few of the more cool-headed players managed to step between the

combatants and the dust finally cleared.

The conduct of a few Stouffville players and spectators cannot be excused, but, the attack on umpire Buckland places a black mark against the Agincourt club. No referee, umpire or official should be subjected to either verbal or physical abuse. Umpire Buckland had issued repeated warnings to the Agincourt bench before the contest was finally halted. His warnings went unbeeded. One of the visiting players had already been ejected from the game in a previous inning. Although every official is subject to error, it was certainly one of the best officiated games we have witnessed locally this season. The sooner these teen-age lads learn the true meaning of the word "sportsmanship" the better it will be both for the game and themselves.

If the contest had been reasonably close, there might have been some reason for dissension between the players and the official, but this wasn't the case. When the first Agincourt player was thumbed from the game, Stouffville was leading 5-2. When the game was awarded to the homesters following relentless "heckling" from the visitors' bench, Stouffville held a one-sided 11-2 advantage.


