

# Army Worms Hit North of Goodwood, York County Reports Still Clear

Army worms by the thousands have moved into a section of Ontario County. Uxbridge Agricultural office reported more than a half dozen farmers in the vicinity of Sandford had found hordes of the crawling eaters in their fields.

A check with the York County Agricultural office showed no serious reports of any army worms so far. Officials of the office had checked a number of farms but found scarcely any of the worms.

In Western Ontario the army worms reached plague proportions, multiplying in hay and wheat fields. Overall damage reports to crops have not been recorded as yet, but Field Crop officials of the Dept. of Agriculture reported that as the hay is cut and wheat matures, the worms are expected to move into oat and corn fields.

Farmers are advised to watch their fields closely for any migration from one field to another. If the greyish-brown worms from a half-inch to two inches in length are sighted in hay and wheat, the chances are they will soon begin a move to greener pastures.

**Folioson Bait Best**  
The easiest and cheapest method of retarding their progress

and thinning out their numbers is to plow a furrow around the infested wheat or hay fields and scatter poison bait in the furrow. Poison bait can be prepared by mixing 100 lbs. of bran, 1 gallon of molasses, 8 gallons of water, and one of the following: 4 lbs. Paris Green, 1½ lbs. actual Aldrin, Dieldrin or Heptachlor, or 2 lbs. actual Shlordane, or 3 lbs. actual Toxaphene.

The worms usually become active about four o'clock in the afternoon. Therefore, the bait should be put down from noon to four p.m., so that it is fresh and moist.

If the worms are already in the oat and corn fields, the same poison bait can be scattered by hand over the field at the rate of 25 lbs. per acre; or Aldrin, Toxaphene, Heptachlor or Chlordane can be used as a spray or dust according to manufacturer's directions.

The spray rig travelling through the field will cause some damage. This can be avoided in larger fields by the use of aircraft.

Where army worm infestations are found, farmers are requested to notify the local Agricultural Representative and ask for Ontario Circular 280 which lists methods of control.

## "Live Like Animals" - Brock Rd. Resident

Mrs. George Kowalow, a resident on a private road, south of Brougham, appeared before Pickering Township Council on Monday evening in an effort to have the municipality take over the road in order that the hydro might be installed. Although it was noted that the Kowalows are the lone residents on the road, it was pointed out that additional homes might be erected if the thoroughfare was decided to the township. The hydro are desirous of having at least two services on a road before they erect a line.

"We live like animals," said Mrs. Kowalow. Coal oil lamps are used. Mrs. Kowalow said that this means of lighting made it especially difficult for the children to do their school work. They have no telephone.

"It would seem rather strange that any resident in the centre of the township cannot obtain hydro," said Reeve Lawson. The Reeve stated that he believed the present road-owner would be willing to deed it over to the township.

The Clerk was instructed to find out whether hydro power would be supplied if the road were taken over by the township and what the cost might be for the user.

Police Council verbally expressed their confidence in the operation of the township police department. "They are doing an excellent job," said councillor Robt. Stewart. It was noted that the force was "cracking down" on speeders. Fines for the month of June amounted to \$500.00.

"Fake" Salesman  
Councillor Glenn Julian informed the members that a number of "tricky" salesmen were operating in the southerly sections of the township. He said that these men were attempting to sell furnaces to operate when the proposed Consumer's Gas line was completed. Councillor Sid Pugh noted that the gas line would be laid only along a certain route and through built-up areas. He said that residents on many roads would not be able to hook up to the proposed line.

Reeve Lawson asked the Clerk to contact the Consumer's Gas Company and inform them of the scheme.

Councillor Sid Pugh said that similar salesmen were operating in the township selling vacuum cleaners and kitchen utensils.
