Bible School Great Success

One of the largest Bible Schools ever held in the Town of Stouffville, during the past two weeks, came to a close Friday evening July 19th. After using the Public School, also the United Missionary Church, for the school it was necessary for us to have our closing exercises in the United Church which was filled for the closing of the School.

Rev. Frank Huson who has directed the School gave a report of the work that had been done, also expressed his appreciation to all those who helped to make it a great success. Over 3,056 teachers and scholars attended the School; this year there was an enrollment of 442, the highest for one day 325 and the average for the ten days was 305. This is considered one of the largest, for the size of the Town in the Province of Ontario. Ten different denominations were represented, including Roman Catholics. The cost of running the School amounted to \$238.00. The amount collected on the closing night was \$136.04. Donations from United Church \$10; from Christian Church (Stouffville) \$10, individual contributions \$26, making a total of \$182.04. Rev. debt against the land. "Why shouldn't the vacant lots pay? People pay school taxes who have no children; it's the same thing," said councillor Wylie.

"I wonder if we're obligated to collect the garbage at all," commented reeve Legge; "maybe we should cancel the whole thing."

"We couldn't do that, there'd be garbage all over the roads," replied councillor Wylie.

The clerk further added that the ratepayers were incensed about paying for garbage collection in the winter when they are not at the lake.

"I don't think there are many worried about it, just a few trying to stir up something," said councillor Wallwork.

"We're going according to the Act, that's all we can do," said councillor Williams.

The Clerk was instructed to advise the garbage collector to continue to collect garbage twice a week.
