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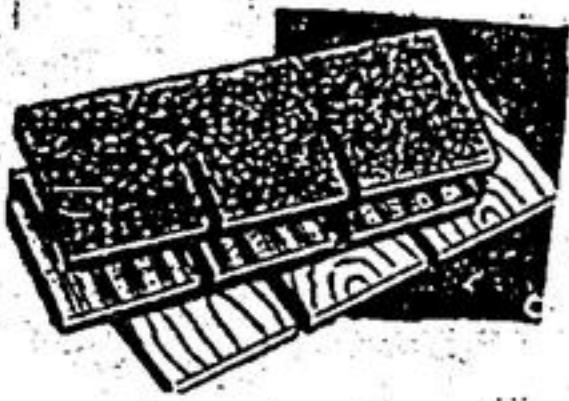
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**STOUFFVILLE**

The farm was sold some time ago and recently a large development company has sought permission to erect some 300 cottages around the lake. The place had excellent facilities for a young people's summer camp, but is slowly being turned into a public playground, beach and park.

## Sewage Problems "Boiling" in Nearby Centres

Many lingering problems of sewage disposal not previously too apparent have been brought to a boil in York County by the present rapid growth of some of the townships, towns and villages. The increased demand for safe clean water supplies has not gone unheeded, and Markham and Vaughan townships, Richmond Hill, Aurora and Newmarket have taken pains to expand their supplies to meet the demands of the growing population. Most municipalities have also concerned themselves with safe and sanitary sewage disposal methods to protect the health of present citizens and new citizens in numerous new houses, streets and subdivisions.

Richmond Hill installed and placed in operation a community sewage disposal system in 1951. The already overtaxed system has now been expanded to accommodate the rapidly growing volume of potentially dangerous sewage and to provide some reserve capacity for additional sewage from future growth.

Aurora's additional capacity for its sewage disposal plant is ready to be placed in operation to adequately handle its overtaxed sewage demands.

Stouffville has just placed in operation its recently installed sewage disposal system, thus rescuing the village from literally sinking into a quagmire of inoperative septic tanks laced with polluted streams.

Markham township is launching a program to install a safe water supply and sewerage system for the developed residential southwest corner of the township.

Sutton is about to place in operation its newly installed community water system, thus ensuring a safe and clean water supply to residents previously dependent on well water from an increasingly contaminated water table.

Markham Village has its well laid plans for a community sewerage system before the Ontario Municipal Board for approval of financing. There is no reason why this project should not be shortly underway.

Newmarket has concerned itself with ensuring increased water supplies to meet the demands of its growing population. But Newmarket with its growing population in the neighbourhood of 8,000 persons, continues to dump its entire volume of sewage, raw and untreated, into the waters of the Holland river at several points as it passes through the town. Continuing delay in treating Newmarket sewage to retrieve the Holland river from contamination will undoubtedly raise grave health hazards for not only the downstream residents of the township of East Gwillimbury but also for the residents of the town of Newmarket itself. The

effects of inadequate sewage treatment can be various and roundabout. The cleanliness of the watershed is increasingly jeopardized. Future water supplies are possibly damaged beyond repair. A host of possible diseases stand menacingly suspicious in the shadow of human waste. Wholesome growth of the community no doubt requires a certain degree of industrial expansion. But community-minded industries will not locate in municipalities with unsolved sewage disposal problems. All of these effects have a direct influence on the public health of the town of Newmarket.

A survey of the degree of contamination and pollution in the waters of the Holland river in the vicinity of Newmarket is about to be carried on by the Ontario Water Resources Commission in co-operation with the local health unit. The findings of this survey should prove valuable and instructive to the citizens of the town of Newmarket and to the residents of the township downstream from the town through which the Holland river passes.

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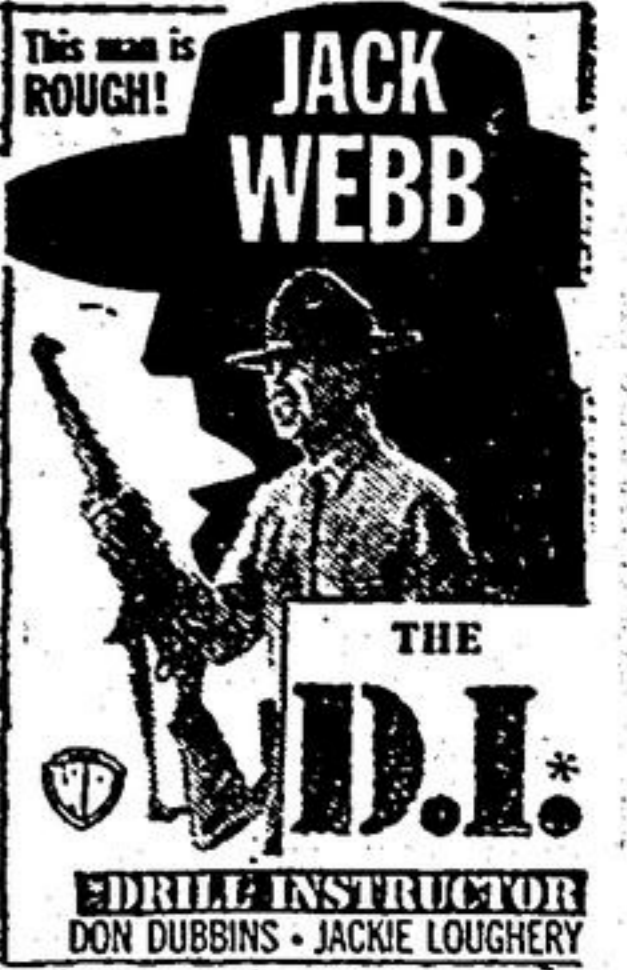

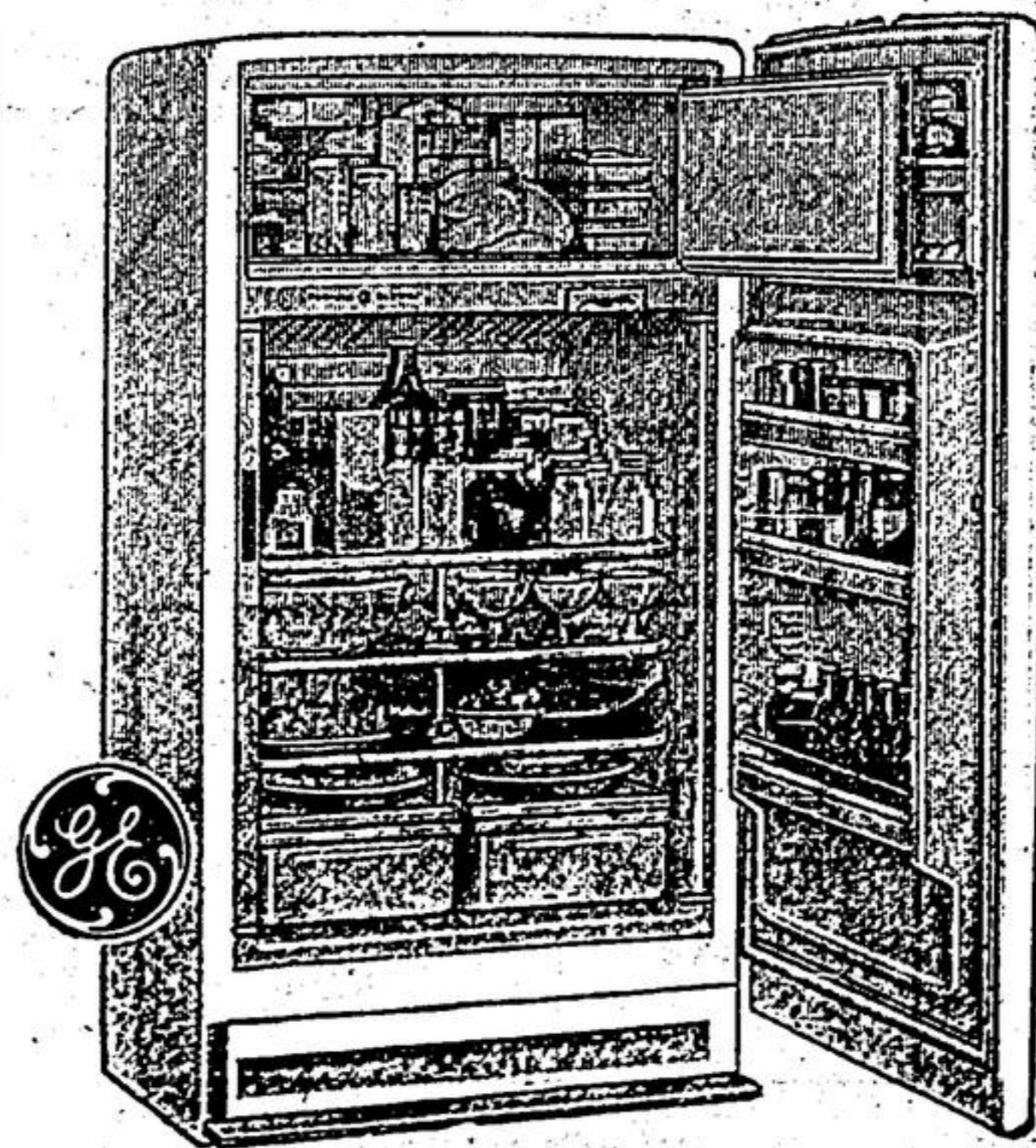
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
