double and Ted Suzuki was safe on an error. Wayne Redshaw singled and Lynn Taylor was hit by a wild pitch to load up the sacks. With two out, Ross Madill went down swinging to retire the side and end the game.

Wayne Redshaw's batting average continued on the upswing. The local centrefielder banded out a pair of singles in three trips. The only extra-base blow came from the bat of Bob Stover, a pinch-hit double in the 5th. Ted Suzuki and Gord Eckardt poled singles.

Righthander Harry Barber was given unusually weak support in the field. His mates committed a total of five errors. Newmarket had one bobble. The contest was halted in the fifth, due to darkness.

AREA GROUSE SEASON WILL OPEN OCT. 5

Ontario will be divided into four areas for the open season on ruffed grouse, sharp-tailed grouse and spruce partridge, Lands Minister Mapledoram announced last week.

North and west of Highway 17 from Mattawa to Sault Ste. Marie—the season will run from Sept. 16 to Nov. 25.

Limits Defined South of this and east of Highways 69 and 12—from the north boundary of Muskoka southward, except for regulated townships in Ontario and Durham Counties—the season will be from Sept. 28 to Nov. 25.

lated townships in York, Ontario and Simcoe counties. The season in that area will be from Oct. 5 to Nov. 25.

Possession Limited The fourth area comprises the rest of the province and the season will be from Nov. 11 to Nov. 23.

Daily bag limit is five birds except in area four where it is 3. Possession limit is 20 birds. Mr. Mapledoram also announced there will be an open season for Hungarian partridge from Sept. 28 to Oct. 14. Bag limit will be eight birds, possession limit 16.

KEEP the larder filled without emptying the purse! It's easy if you have commodious home storage facilities and use proper methods so food does not spoil.

Always sort produce before storage so you can remove any items which show decay or injury. These can probably be used if you plan them for that same day or at least the next day's meals.

If you store in a cellar, keep the atmosphere damp for most fruits and vegetables. Hold the

Spinach Vinaigrette (Serves 6)
2 packages frozen chopped spinach
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons olive oil
2 tablespoons tarragon vinegar
2 hard-cooked egg yolks
Cook spinach with salt until tender. Drain off water. To serve mix spinach with oil, vinegar and egg yolk, chopped fine.

temperature just above freezing to prevent drying or wilting. Inspect storage facilities such as a cellar, on a regular routine, so decaying material can be whisked out promptly.

At least once a year the cellar or storage space should be thoroughly cleaned to keep it sanitary.

Many foods can be protected more easily if they are in ventilated plastic sacks. Apples, for example, will keep beautifully, and so will potatoes and onions.

Storage space must be ventilated to dissipate odors and help maintain the proper temperature and humidity. Windows or vents can be opened at night or when outside temperature is just above freezing and the air relatively moist.
