Markham Edge Pt. Dover 3-2; Parsons Sensational

Stouffville's "Chuck" Parsons twirled a sizzling three hitter on Sunday afternoon as the Markham Red Sox edged Port Dover 3-2 in the Ontario Junior "C" semi-finals. They now move into the championship finals and will battle either Tilbury or Wheatley.

Markham appeared rather shaky in the opening inning. A pair of hits and two errors allowed Port Dover to jump into a 2-0 lead. It was not until the fifth inning that Markham got to the offerings of righthander Al Langford. Mike Pettit, an all-around athlete, started the ball rolling with a single. Allan Tidbury connected for a base hit to put two Markham men on base. An error on Geo. Christopher allowed the Red Sox to break the ice. Trailing 2-1 and

with two mates aboard, hard-hitting catcher, Bob Atkinson smashed a triple into the deep outfield to push Tidbury and Christopher across the plate with the tying and game-winning runs.

More than 100 partisan fans cheered their Markham favorites as they held the Port Dover homesters off the score sheet for the remainder of the contest. For seven successive innings, Parsons held the "Sailors" hitless. Only in the first and ninth innings did they connect for three safeties. "He was marvelous," said John Wegg, club secretary, "one of the finest Junior pitchers in the business."

The line score was as follows: Markham—3 runs, 5 hits, 2 errors; Pt. Dover—2 runs, 3 hits, 2 errors.

Peach's Beat Ringwood 11-3 In Argument Filled Contest

Peach's ousted Ringwood from the Community League semi-finals on Friday night by a score of 11-3 in a controversial contest.

Cards Belt Newcastle 18-4 Enter All-Ontario Finals

Stouffville's Juvenile Cardinals are undisputed holders of the Eastern Ontario Juvenile "C" Championship. They will now battle Caledonia for the All-Ontario honours. On Saturday afternoon, they drubbed Newcastle 18-4 to sweep the best of three game series in 2 straight. They squeezed out a 9-8 decision in the opener. The contest was played under protest here, on Saturday. The Newcastle Management said, following the game, that they had not definitely decided to follow-through with the protest.

How Many? For Stouffville, it was just a question of how many runs they could collect in nine innings. They jumped into an early lead and never were headed. With the exception of the sixth and eighth innings, the Cards counted runs in every stanza. In the fourth inning, Stouffville batted completely around the order as nine men paraded to the plate.

Holden the Winner Left-hander Murray Holden twirled a fine game for the Cards. Although clipped for ten hits, the safeties were well spaced throughout the contest. He walked three and struck out seven. The Stouffville south-paw appeared to improve with every inning. Depending mainly on "stuff", the local "lefty" confined the rival batsmen to only a pair of extra base blows, a double in the first and a home run in the seventh. The remaining eight hits were all single-base blows.

"Hot Dog" Wayne "Wiener" Redshaw,

was the hot dog in the home-ster's lineup in Saturday's tilt. Baiting in the number 2 position, the Claremont slugger banged out three singles and a triple in six trips to the plate. A single-base blow in the 7th inning, came with the sacks loaded and drove in two runs. In addition to his plate prowess, Redshaw turned in a fine fielding performance. He tucked away two long fly balls, one from the bat of first baseman Bill Brent in the fifth and another on a well-hit ball by left fielder Ron Dickinson. In the seventh inning, Eric Carleton drove the ball back near the centrefield fence and as Redshaw circled into position, it bounced off the soccer cross-bar. Since no ground rule had been made to cover such an occurrence, the Newcastle player was credited with a home run.

Three Pitchers Newcastle pressed three pitchers into service in an effort to halt Stouffville's plate attack. Ted Lane started on the mound and worked two and two-thirds innings. He was clipped for six hits. Neil Chard took over but pitched to only four batters. In his short stay on the hill, he allowed three hits, two doubles and a triple. Eric Carleton replaced Chard and finished the game. He was also hit rather freely during his five inning stint on the hill. Stouffville batsmen collected 8 hits from his offerings. He walked four and registered six strike outs.

Ten Errors Newcastle's pitching staff was given rather feeble support. The

fielders committed no less than ten errors. Four of these blunders occurred in the first inning. Stouffville played errorless ball.

Everyone Hits Every player in the starting lineup connected for at least one safe hit. Wayne Redshaw, of course, paced the attack with a prolific performance. Clean-up batter, Don Haynes, pounded out two singles and a double while Bob Stover clouted a pair of doubles. Ross Madill and John Little each tapped out a double and a single. Single-base blows came from the bats of Ted Suzuki, Gord Eckardt, Lynn Taylor and Murray Holden.

Visitors' Best Eric Carleton was Newcastle's best batter. He hammered out two singles and a home run. Charlie Trim connected for a double and a single. Ron Dickinson and Paul McCullough each tapped out a pair of singles.

File Protest The Newcastle Management notified umpire Morris Procenko in the sixth inning that the game was being played under protest. This action was taken after the plate official called a "balk" on Newcastle pitcher, Eric Carleton. The Management said later, that the protest was still under consideration.

Old Rivals Barring any delay, the Cardinals will now meet Caledonia for the Ontario Championship. These players will not be strangers to our Stouffville boys as they squared off last year in Midget competition.

DEPT. ANNOUNCES SEASON ON DUCKS

Open seasons and bag limits for migratory birds in Ontario, 1957, have been announced by the Hon. Clare E. Mapledoram, Minister of Lands and Forests, as follows:

In the Central and Southern Districts the open seasons commence at 9 a.m., Eastern Standard Time.

Ducks, Geese, Rails, Coots, Gallinules, Woodcock and Wilson's Snipe.

In the Northern District, Sept. 14th to Dec. 14.

In the Central District 9 a.m. Sept. 28 to Dec. 14.

In the Southern District, except that in Essex County the open season for geese is from 9 a.m. Oct. 5 to Dec. 31 inclusive.

The Northern District of Ontario comprises the Territorial Districts of Kenora, Patricia, Rainy River, Thunder Bay, Cochran and Timiskaming and those portions of Algoma, Sudbury and Nipissing lying northerly of Highway 17 between Mattawa and Sault Ste. Marie and northerly of the International Boundary between Sault Ste. Marie and Lake Superior.

The Southern District comprises those parts of Muskoka District and Simcoe County lying west of Highway 69 in Ontario County, those parts of the townships of Rama, Mara, Thorah, Brock, and Reach lying west of Highway 69 to 12, and the townships of Scott, Uxbridge, Pickering, Whitby and East Whitby; in Durham County, the townships of Darlington and Clarke, and the counties of Brant, Bruce, Dufferin, Elgin, Essex, Grey, Haldimand, Halton, Huron, Kent, Lambton, Lincoln, Middlesex, Norfolk, Oxford, Peel, Perth, Waterloo, Welland, Wellington, Wentworth, York.

The Central District comprises all that part of the Provinces which is not included in the Northern District or the Southern District.

Daily Bag Limit — Ducks 8, Geese 5, Coots, Rails and Gallinules 25, Wilson's Snipe 8, Woodcock 8.

Possession limits — Ducks 16, Geese 10, Wilson's Snipe 8, Woodcock 16.
