**Buttonville Driver is Jailed, Sequel to Fatality**

A double fatality, Feb. 23, had its sequel in the Oshawa Police court last week when Magistrate F. S. Ebbs sentenced Derek Maw, 19, of Buttonville, to the maximum three months in jail, on a careless driving charge.

Reviewing the case, which was remanded for judgment, His Worship noted that the accused had been driving a car along the 6th concession of Whitby Twp., Feb. 2, and had collided with a bridge. Two of the passengers were killed, the magistrate noted. He added that police had stated that Maw had smelled of alcohol. An independent witness, he said, had testified that the accused had been speeding.

Recommending a heavy sentence, Crown Attorney Alex Hall QC, said: "Three months, the maximum for this offence seems like a long time. However, the victims will be dead a long time."

"You have no right to be drinking at your age," the magistrate said. "This sort of case is causing much concern to the courts."

**Bloat Common in Fall**

Many cattle, especially high producing cows, tend to bloat on succulent legume pastures at this time of the year, and Agricultural Representative W. M. Cockburn has been warning farmers over the radio to take preventative measures to avoid the loss of some of their good cattle. He claims that 90% of the cases of bloat can be avoided whereas some years there have been as high as 500 head picked up by the fertilizer companies. This would represent a loss to York farmers of over \$100,000 in a bad year.

Most York County soils are deficient in phosphorous, and this deficiency, reflected in the crops, is apparently more marked in the fall of the year. Coupled with this is the fact that grass production is at a low level, making a preponderance

of alfalfa. While there is little danger of bloat with a pasture of 50% of actual grass, a pasture producing largely alfalfa is very dangerous and especially following a rainy spell such as we have had recently.

Mr. Cockburn's advice is to add to the regular mineral mixture, one part of Disodium Phosphate to about four parts of mineral mixture, at least for the fall months. Most mineral mixtures are prepared for average conditions and the extra phosphate in the fall, especially in a phosphate deficient district, costs very little and is very effective.

**NOTICE TO Markham Township Ratepayers**

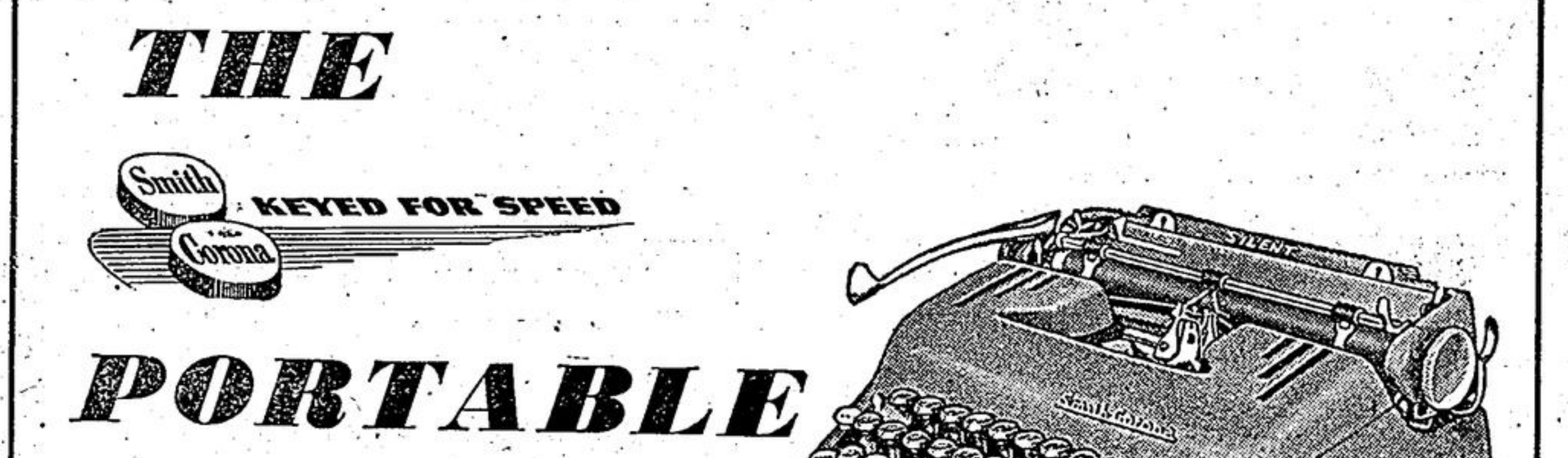
