The seventh concession squad reached the end of the rainbow on Friday evening when they emerged the victors of the Claremont Community League. Although no pot of gold awaited the winners, the coveted bronze-plaqued trophy was received with just as much enthusiasm.

With "Peg" O'Neill's pitching prowess paving the way through the regular schedule, the team had little trouble catching a playoff spot. Their hopes waned somewhat, however, early in the playoffs when their plucky control-artist suffered a pulled muscle in his right arm, forcing him into semi-retirement. As if in answer to Coach Warriner's prayers, Don Wheeler suddenly appeared on the scene and aided the winners' cause. O'Neill returned to action to chalk up an important victory and with the honours in sight, nothing could stand in their way.

In the final game, the run-hungry batsmen smote two rival hurlers in an unmerciful fifteen hit attack. Their second-string pitchers looked like seasoned veterans. Although not an active participant in the game, he has filled in as a pinch-hitter on a number of occasions this season. He has become a familiar figure in the third base coaching box.

With the completion of playoff finals, the curtain descends on another thrilling season of community softball activity. What will next year bring? No one really knows. It is our hope that the Claremont League will continue to flourish, providing weekly entertainment for dozens of players and a host of fans.


