## To Open Brock Road Red Cross Centre Sat.

The new Red Cross Centre on the Brock Rd., Pickering Twp., will be the setting this Saturday, Oct. 26th of an official opening ceremony.

The Open House, jointly sponsored by the Pickering Red Cross and the Ajax-Pickering and Whitby Association for Retarded Children, will feature the work of both organizations. Of particular interest will be the school for retarded children, one of the few of its kind in Canada.

What started as a dream has now become a reality with the opening of the school. In the past these were "forgotten" children. Today, a growing number are receiving an opportunity to get educated and make a gradual adjustment to a normal society.

Provincial Police Staff Sgt. Albert Bird, president of the Association, was instrumental in launching the school for retarded children in this area. After a fine start the school was required to vacate its premises in a back room of the Ajax fire-hall.

The Pickering Red Cross, which had at that time acquired the Brock Rd. school, then offered the association use of half the school to carry on its good work. The association members expended much time and effort to renovate their section to bring it up to a high standard.

The general public is invited to see how this unique school works and inspect the new quarters of the Pickering Red Cross which has just begun its renovations. William G. Lawson, Reeve of Pickering Township, will officiate at the opening ceremony.

The Red Cross Centre is situated on the Brock Road at the Fourth Concession in Pickering Township, three miles south of Brougham. It is a building with a colorful past and many residents of Ontario County should be interested in the newest chapter of its history.

The Pickering Red Cross which has had the use of a small room in the Municipal Building in Brougham will now centre its activities in its new quarters. Some of the projects that it is hoped, will be carried on are the women's work, a meeting place for senior citizens, training courses, among others; and eventually some work of homemaker's service which has been a dire need in the township and village for many years.

The Open House will also feature a bazaar and a bake sale. Some free refreshment will be provided. The brief official ceremony will start at 1:30 p.m. after which everyone will be free to mingle, ask questions, and feel right at home in an undertaking that is benefiting the community at large.

## Councillor Desires Hold-up of School Debentures By-law

Councillor Glenn Julian objected strongly to the presentation of a \$65,000 debenture by-law for the erection of a four room addition to West Rouge school in Pickering Township. The rather lengthy discussion on the matter took place at a meeting of Council on Monday evening.

Councillor Julian stated that he didn't object to the school addition but felt it wasn't necessary to give the debenture by-law two readings at this time. He said it was unlikely that any construction work on the project would be started until well on in 1958.

"The area is burdened with school tax now," he noted. "We shouldn't pay interest on money that's not needed."

Councillor Robt. Stewart pointed out that the debenture by-law had been requested by the School Board. "They should know what they want," he said. Clerk Lloyd Johnston explained that approval had been received from the Dept. of Education.

"I don't think we should hold up the trustees," said Reeve Lawson.

Due to the lateness of the hour, further work on the bylaw was held over until the next meeting of Council.

Decline Support

Council expressed concern with a reply received from the Board of School Area No. 2 with regard to support for pupils from their district attending the school for retarded children now located at Brock Road. The letter informed Council that following discussion with the School Inspector, it was decided that no financial support would

be forthcoming from their Area. "It's robbery," charged Councillor Glenn Julian. "The parents of these children pay taxes in the Area and their children have a right to be educated. Clerk Lloyd Johnston informed Council that eight children from Pickering Township were attending the school. No word had been received from the other school boards affected.

"I feel the School Boards are morally obligated to give these children some financial support," said Councillor Sid Pugh.

Should Resign

"I would suggest that the Planning Board resign," stated Dep. Reeve Sherman Scott. Mr. Scott's statement followed a request by Councillor Glenn Julian that Council interview a number of Planning Consultants at a special meeting. Dep. Reeve Scott told the meeting that the Township Planning Board had already interviewed a number of Planning Consultants and had pared the tenders down to two.

"Apparently there is a feeling here in Council that the Planning Board is not competent enough to make such decisions," charged Dep. Reeve Scott.

"That remark was uncalled for," fired back Councillor Julian.

At this point, Reeve Lawson squelched further across-the-table remarks between the members.

With Dep. Reeve Scott in the chair, it was moved by Councillor Edgar James and seconded by Wm. Lawson that two firms, Project Planners and Proctor Redfern be interviewed by Council. The motion carried.
