Town Assessment Court

(Continued from front)
land assessment as well, comparing it with down-town business properties.
Assessor Lloyd Turner pointed out that the land was assessed for \$16 a ft. frontage, while down-town the rate was \$25 a foot.
The court members expressed the view that since there were five apartments and three business premises below, the assessment was not out of line, and sustained the assessor's figures.
Representatives of the Ladies Wear Canada Ltd., appeared before the court and asked for an explanation of an assessment which had been increased to four times the amount in 1957.
"You can't beat the measured system," the representative stated, "but we would like an explanation."

The assessors explained that the business assessment which is now \$4,775, was based on the percentage of the building that they were using, as it related to the total assessment on the building. The assessment was sustained.
T. B. O'Neill and R. B. O'Neill, appearing on behalf of the Cossy Floral Co., objected to a total assessment of \$16,896.
Their chief concern was that, despite the fact that between 1956 and 1957, six acres of the land had been disposed of, their

assessment was still higher.
Assessor Turner pointed out that there had been a complete re-valuation of the land assessment in town and the higher rate had increased the total amount despite the fact that the acreage was less.
The assessor further explained that the greenhouses with 43,000 sq. ft. under glass was assessed for 40c, the lowest rate allowed in the manual for such establishments. The court sustained this assessment.
An appeal by the downtown Texaco Station of J. W. Perkins against a total assessment of \$6040 was sustained as well as that of Mrs. Elva Sawyer against an assessment of \$2335.
Appeals by Jos. Borinsky and the Canadian National Railways were withdrawn before the court convened.

Tax Cancellation
Mr. Everett Jones was allowed a tax cancellation of \$25 due to the fact that for six months a new house which he erected on Church St. was not occupied. County Assessor Jones stated that the court could only deal with this matter under the Assessment Act as a tax cancellation.

Tax Rebates
Several tax rebates amounting to \$288.52 and approved by council were also approved by the Court of Revision.

New Luxury Model Is Offered By Buick

Details of the 1958 Buick, including many mechanical and styling innovations and the introduction of a new luxury series known as the Limited, were made known this week by General Motors of Canada.
The 1958 models, with dynamic new styling, feature the new miracle ride, a revolutionary new Dynaflo transmission, improved brakes with thicker linings and a host of other engineering changes.

The new Buicks come in five series, topped by the new Limited, a distinctively-styled model which is Buick's new entry in the prestige car market.

"This is the beginning of a new era for Buick," a General Motors spokesman said. "Our new styling, which features the most dazzling grille design in the history of Buick, is a complete departure from the industry's traditional front end design."

"With the new air-poise suspension, which literally floats the car on four columns of air; the new flight pitch Dynaflo transmission, which provides a spectacular increase in performance, and the new air-cooled aluminum brakes, Buick attains a new high in automotive engineering."

All models are equipped with dual headlights on each front fender. The new styling features are apparent from every angle, with the most spectacular change in the grille. Previously, grilles have been distinguished by vertical or horizontal bars of chrome, varying in design. Instead of chrome bars, the new Buick grille is distinguished by chrome squares, like jewels, set in four rows that extend all the way across the front to the outer extremities of the car.

The fender line has been lowered and the hood line raised slightly to complement the new front end design.

The front fenders project out over the headlights and the leading edge is capped by a chrome strip which extends around the fender and becomes part of the side molding. This molding extends gracefully along the side of the car, all the way back to the rear wheel cutout, which has been modified to reveal only the lower portion of the wheel.

A "V" and ring adorn each front fender on all models to make it easier to gauge distance in traffic.

The rear fenders of all models are topped by a chrome applique which blends with the newly-styled tail light housing. Heading the list of exclusive engineering achievements on the 1958 Buicks is the new flight pitch Dynaflo transmission in which the stator vanes operate on the same "switch the pitch" principle as an airplane propeller.

The new transmission also has three turbines instead of two, which increases the torque output. Replacing the low range position on the Dynaflo quadrant is a grade, or hill retarder, (G), to give greater transmission brakage on hills, reducing the wear on brakes.

Flight pitch Dynaflo is standard on the Limited and Roadmaster series and optional on all other models. Variable pitch Dynaflo is standard on the Super and Century series and optional on the Special.

Air suspension is optional equipment on all models. All brakes on the 1958 Buicks have been improved for safer operation. All cars are equipped with 12-inch brakes. Total contact area has been increased to 218 inches.

All cars are powered by a 364 cubic inch high compression V-8 engine, with two-barrel carburetor on the Special and four-barrel on all other models.

The new models come in 20 body styles mounted on two wheelbases, 122 inches for the Special and Century, and 127.5 inches for the other four series.

In the field of color, Buick offers 15 new tints on all its 1958 models. New shades are Cay / Coral Metallic, Forest Green Metallic, Seaforth Green, Viking Blue, Rio Red, Sierra Gold Metallic, Silver Blue Metallic, Marlin Turquoise Metallic, Mountain Haze and Starlight Blue Metallic.

Held over from 1957 because of their popularity are Onyx Black, Dover White, Colonial Cream and Silver-Grey Metallic.
