**TRUCKERS BLAMED
FOR MARKET VOTE**

Much of the pressure to have a vote on the marketing plan of the Ontario Hog Producers Marketing Board has been generated by the Ontario Truckers and Shippers Association. Chas. McInnis, president of the Hog Association charged last week. "These shippers and truckers who have no right to interfere with producer-marketing plans recently held meetings in Harrison and Arthur and from these meetings representations were made urging a vote on our hog marketing plan," Mr. McInnis said.

"Unfortunately, these efforts on the part of shippers and truckers, who for too long a period have received millions of dollars in under-the-table payments from the processors to act as their agents, can seriously interfere with the progress of our hog-directional program," Mr. McInnis said, "and our hog producers across Ontario will lose thousands of dollars."

"For the past two months through our directional-program we have been gradually instituting a system of open-marketing of hogs in Ontario," Mr. McInnis said. "Reaching the present point in our marketing plan has required 17 years of tireless effort by our hog association, and now we are faced with one of the most ironical situations of our whole history where a shippers and truckers association is instrumental in bringing our whole program to a temporary standstill."

**Whitchurch Twp. and
Newmarket Plan. Bds.
Discuss Conservation**

Regional planning is the key to conservation problems. This was a view expressed at a joint conference of the Newmarket and Whitchurch planning boards who were guests of the Newmarket Yacht club recently.

The meeting held the view that the development of self-contained satellite cities such as Newmarket, was preferable to a further extension of Metropolitan sprawl. Air pollution, transportation, civil defence and the current trend to decentralization were reasons advanced in support of this theory.

The green belt of farms, open space and woodlands which was considered desirable to separate the Metropolitan centre from the satellite, might be practically approached by protecting and improving river valleys for future public enjoyment. Attention was drawn to the Don, Humber and Holland River Valleys and the geographical pattern of their tributaries which in itself provides a golden opportunity

for initial work in this direction. It was reported that a considerable area of land had already been improved by conservation methods. From the long range view the delegates saw many advantages arising from conservation; the preservation of natural drainage patterns and the eventual provision of recreational areas were seen as the more important.

Recognizing that the improvement scheme does not conform to corporate boundaries, considerable time was devoted to the discussion of regional or inter-municipal planning. It was the view of the meeting that problems of mutual interest requiring the attention of a permanent specialist group, could be handled by joint financing, thus relieving each of the several municipalities of the burden of retaining their own staff or consultants. Common policy, co-ordination of effort and a logical sequence of development were seen as the primary advantages.

**Refuse To Re-Name
County Bridge**

Pickering Twp. Council, meeting in regular session on Monday evening, agreed unanimously to retain the present name of the County bridge on the Ajax-Pickering townline. Presently known as the Larkin bridge, it had been suggested in County Council that it be re-named the John Mills bridge. Mr. John Mills is the Reeve of Ajax.

Reeve Wm. Lawson voiced strong objection to the move, stating that such an act would destroy the historical value of the structure. Dep. Reeve Sherman Scott stated that in his opinion there was no real reason to change the bridge's name. It was agreed that the bridge should retain its former identification.
