TODAY'S PROBLEM—MASTERING WORRY

Althea Morton, 909 Fifth Ave. W., Calgary, says at one time she was carrying a load which was far too heavy for her. Her father was an invalid, her mother was not too strong and was taxed to the uttermost in caring for her husband, so she soon succumbed and took to her bed most of the day.

Althea arose extra early every morning, prepared breakfast for the family, then left for her job in a large department store. On the way home from her work in the late afternoon she did the family marketing, went home and prepared dinner, served it, ate hurriedly and washed the dishes. After dinner she got at the numerous chores that had to be done, which included laundry work.

After months of this strenuous life, she began to feel pains in her stomach. The doctor told her the sole cause of her trouble, was too little relaxation and too much worry. His diagnosis and prescription did little for her; the pains became worse, and her worries trebled.

One day she chanced across an article on worry which read that one must master worry or worry would master him. The next day she passed a church with an open door. She went in and sat there for nearly all of her lunch hour. When she came out she had found courage to conquer her worry.

The first thing she did was to change her routine. She prepared breakfast of fruit and cereal the night before, so she didn't have to do that work in the morning. She gave up the mid-day visit to her home. No matter how things were going, her visits had helped very little, if at all. In stead she took a walk or relaxed in church. At night, after dinner, she stacked the dishes and watched television, and then tackled the dishes and the next morning's breakfast—and she finished much more quickly than formerly.

But there was something else as great and maybe more important than these reformed measures: every time an unhappy thought entered her mind, she crossed it out with a pleasant one or recited an inspiring poem. And that was all that Althea Morton did to conquer ulcers, which became just a bad memory after a few months.

Bulls Average \$1115 At Gormley Auction

The third annual sale of animals from the noted Romandale Farms Holstein herd of S. B. Roman at Gormley, Ontario, saw eighteen bulls bring an average of \$1115. The entire offering realized \$39,250 for 64 head, an average of \$613. The sale was held in a tent at the farm on November 11, and despite cool weather, attracted a crowd of 500.

Five of the 18 bulls brought \$2000 or more. All five of these were bred by the noted Class Extra bull, A.B.C. Reflection Sovereign, famous sire of prize winners including the All-Canadian and All-American Get-of-Sire for three consecutive years.

Top price of \$3000 was paid by J. W. Hoaford, South Edmonton, Alta., for Romandale Texal Reflection, a seven months old bull calf. His dam is the Excellent cow Mahoney Babe Lochivar with two yearly records above 25,000 lbs. of milk.

Picasso Bro., Ica, Peru, paid \$2100 for a ten months old son of Texal Fond Hope Darkie, the All-Canadian two-year-old heifer of 1954. A son of Darkie's dam, I-sella Texal, went to Xavier Usallaga, Celaya, Mexico at \$2000.

Both G. E. D. Greene, Agincourt, Ont., and the Augustinian Fathers, King City, Ont., paid \$2000 for bulls out of Excellent daughters of Highcroft, who sired the 1956 All-Canadian Get-of-Sire for Romandale. In each case a half interest in these bulls was then re-purchased by Romandale Farms at \$1000 each.

A.B.C. Reflection Sovereign sons and grandsons were also purchased by the following: C. Lunnis, Lima, Peru at \$900; Saskatchewan Department of Public Health, Regina at \$800; Richard Schlotssner, Jerseyville, Ont., three bulls at a total of \$1675 for export to Mexico; Hays Farms, Oakville, for export to Venezuela, at \$750; Grey County Home, Markdale, Ont., at \$750; Olaf Anderson, Aylsbarh, Sask., at \$550; Hec-tina Farms, Clarence, N.Y., at \$775.

Solanos Rio, Tacuarembu, Uruguay, bought a five months old son of Bond Haven Rag Apple Maple at \$1450. He also paid the top price for a female of \$1250 for Netherland Browns Diamond, a bred heifer.

Of the 64 head offered 33 were sold for export, 13 to the U.S.A. and the balance to Latin American countries.

18 bulls averaged \$1115 each; 31 milking females \$880; 10 bred heifers \$561 and 5 open heifers \$311.

Reeve Clark of Markham Township announced on Tuesday night that he is definitely in the field for the reeve's chair again for 1958. It is reported that deputy-reeve Deacon will not seek re-election, due to the pressure of business.

Markham's lady councillor, Kathleen James stated that she was prepared to seek the position of deputy-reeve if the present incumbent was not seeking re-election.

Councillor Mumberson was undecided and did not care to make any statement as to his intentions.

Markham Township nomination meeting will be held at Buttonville Hall on Friday afternoon, Nov. 22nd.
