Mrs. Ralph Baker, Victoria St., who has not been well for several weeks has been removed to hospital, friends will regret to learn.

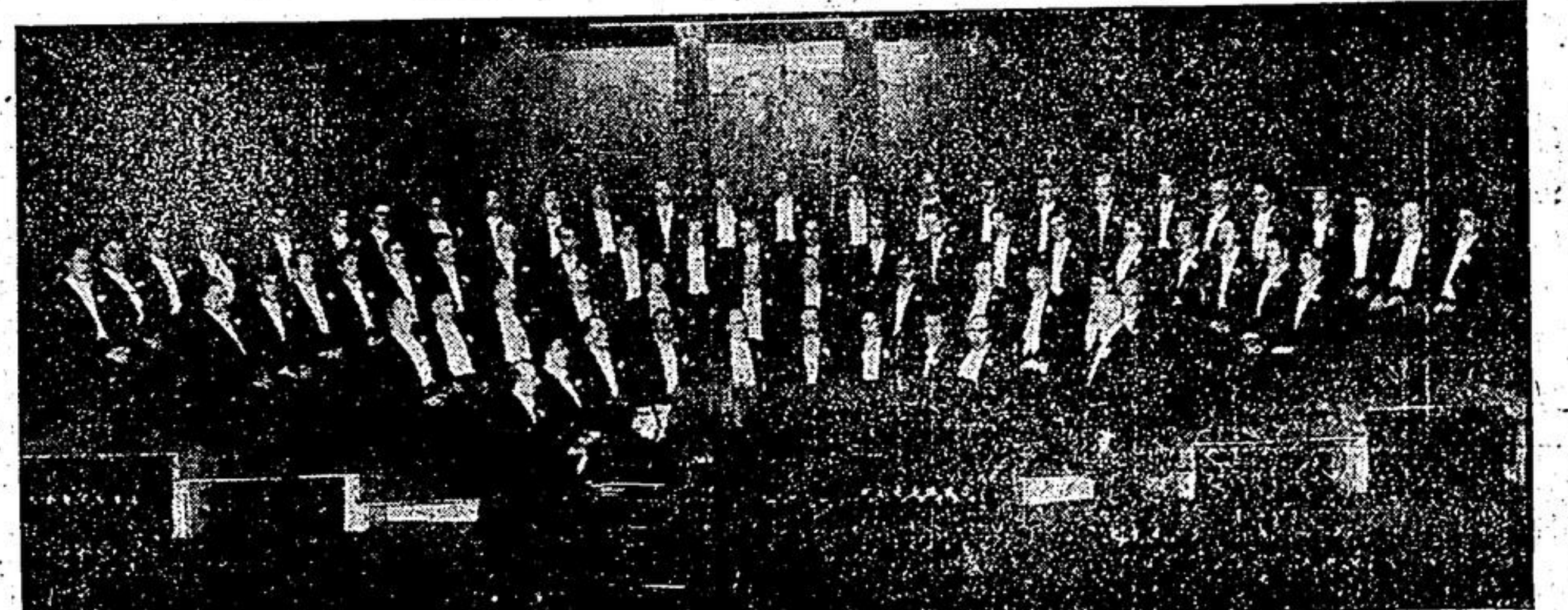
