

CLAREMONT and PICKERING TOWNSHIP DISTRICT

Twp. Council Members Non-Committal as Nomination Nears

With the exception of Councillor Jack Chapman, ward 3 representative on Pickering Township Council, the remaining municipal members are non-committal as to their political plans for 1958. The annual Nomination will be held on Friday evening, Nov. 29th from 6 to 7 o'clock. An election, if necessary, will be held on Saturday, Dec. 7th.

Councillor Jack Chapman told The Tribune that he would definitely be in the field again. He has just completed his first year as Councillor in Ward 3. Although the remaining officeholders were non-committal, it is thought that all seven members will seek Council seats.

Reeve Wm. Lawson said he would make a statement to the press next week with regard to his intentions. It is presumed, however, that the Reeve will seek re-election. The same is true of Dep. Reeve Sherman Scott. Although Deputy Reeve Scott made no definite statement, he intimated that he also would seek re-election.

Councillor Sid Pugh, member for Ward 1, is also expected to seek re-election. Councillors Edgar James of Ward 2 and Robt. Stewart of Ward 5 would not comment on their future plans.

Councillor Glenn Julian, representative from Ward 4, is also expected to return to municipal politics. Due to recent verbal charges between Councillor Julian and other members of Council, much of the pre-nomination interest is centred around his political plans. Earlier in the term, it had been intimated that he might retire from the field at the end of '57, but recent weekly council "explosions" have scuttled this theory. It has since been suggested that he might make an attempt to step up into the office of Deputy Reeve but, to date, there is nothing definite on this rumour.

Mrs. Jean McPherson, a resident on Valley Farm Road and a former Councillor will definitely be in the field again. An almost weekly attendant at municipal meetings, Mrs. McPherson made her intentions known to The Tribune on Monday evening. In the 1956 elections, Mrs. McPherson was defeated by Councillor Julian by 72 votes.

Mr. Wm. Fairgrieve, a resident of Spruce Hill Road, Dunbarton, is also expected to enter the field in next month's election. Though unwilling to make a formal statement, Mr. Fairgrieve said he would be seeking a nomination on Nov. 29th. He declined to comment on whether he would permit his name to stand for election. Throughout the past year, he has attended Council meetings with considerable regularity.

Another possible candidate is Mrs. E. Phelan, a resident south of Greenwood. Mrs. Phelan has been keenly interested in the greenbelt court proceedings and is an active member of the newly organized Greenwood Ratepayers Association. In addition, she has taken much interest in regular and special meetings of Council.

Delegation Objects to Costly Flood Control

A delegation of ratepayers from the Riverside Drive area of Pickering Township, west of Pickering Village, appeared before Council on Monday evening to protest any further expenditure being made to control annual flooding of Duffin's Creek. Mr. Frank Threlkeld, spokesman for the group, stated that the parties requesting Council's action on the matter were a minority in comparison to the residents who were not affected by spring floods.

Mr. Jack Hambleton stated that he didn't believe it was fair for residents not affected by the flood problem to subsidize the cost involved. He said that the Township had already spent more than \$2,000 on the project and were prepared to spend an additional \$60,000 in the near future. He charged that of the 33 homes in the area, only six were seriously affected by the spring flood waters.

"How far do these people want to go with such fantastic proposals?" he asked. He noted that in the past, the majority of ratepayers had not voiced any objection in the matter. "We're fed up," he said.

Mr. Hambleton explained that a large portion of the flood water came from hills in Uxbridge Township which were 1,200 feet higher than the land level near the Lake. He pointed out that no scheme would remedy the problem as silt and sand would continue to fill in the creek bed. He charged that the residents affected had purchased summer cottages in the Riverside Drive area and now desired the Township to pay for their error. He offered two solutions to the problem. (1) Move the residents out of the flood area or hold a plebiscite and allow the people of Pickering Township to express their willingness to support such an expenditure.
