A meeting of the Municipal Electors of the Township of Markham will be held in the

between the hours of 7 & 8 o'clock in the evening for the purpose of nominating candidates for Reeve, Deputy Reeve and Councillor for each of the Wards, 1, 2 and 3, for the year 1958.

Nominations will also be held at the same time for the election of a five-member Board of Trustees to serve Markham Township School Area No. 2 (comprising S.S. No. 8, S.S. No. 9, S.S. No. 14 and S.S. No. 18).

Every nomination must be in writing, on forms provided, and shall be signed by the Proposer and Second, both of whom shall be Municipal Electors and present. When a proposed candidate is not present, his nomination paper shall not be valid unless there is attached thereto evidence satisfactory to the Returning Officer that he consents to be so nominated.


