



TO LEARN OR TEACH Did the Russian hockey team come to Canada to learn or to teach? Although I was not one of the privileged 14,000 persons in attendance at the Gardens on Friday night it was plainly visible on my TV set that our professional clubs might take a few pointers from our Moscow visitors. As far as I'm concerned, the European rules adopted by both the Russian team and the Whiteby club for the much-publicized exhibition tilt are, in many respects, the right rules. The absence of midice boarding, slashing and high-sticking was quite noticeable. This was a sharp contrast to the rough and rugged schmozzles that occur in many of our pro games. The sportsmanlike conduct of the Russ club both before and after the contest, left many critics open-mouthed and red-faced.

I do not intend to take anything away from the Whiteby team. They put up an equally fine performance and will be excellent representatives for Canada at Oslo next spring.

LET'S ENFORCE IT We noted with interest one of the rules written into the regulations of the North York Minor Hockey League under Governor, Mr. Geo. Hasket, of Newmarket. It reads: "Players will be suspended for rough play, fighting and bad language."

Whether this is a new rule in minor hockey, I'm not sure, but if it is, I'm for it. If it has been a rule in previous years, then I would say that it should be more strictly enforced. We must admit that it may be difficult to enforce such a ruling when it comes to the terminology of rough play but it certainly doesn't take any modern-day Einstein to rule on fighting or bad language. A one- or two-game suspension for such occurrences, especially at playoff time, would rapidly break the offenders of such habits.

A situation similar to Stouffville has occurred in Markham Village where an election will be held for the office of Deputy-Reeve. Mrs. Alma Walker the present incumbent, is being opposed by Mr. Chas. W. Reesor and Mr. Samuel Stadelbauer. The election will be held on Monday, Dec. 2nd.

Heated Debate Over Selkirk Sub-division at Markham

Mr. Selkirk, developer of the Selkirk 160-lot sub-division on the south side of No. 7 highway at Langstaff, appeared before Markham Twp. Council on Monday night stating that his land for 1955-56 taxes should have been assessed in block and not by lots, as the sub-division had not been registered at that time. Mr. Selkirk and J. D. Lucas exchanged a warm barrage of claims until Reeve Clark terminated the discussion. It appears he took this before the Court of Revision and received consideration in that they reduced the amount by 50%. No further appeal was made by Selkirk and the time for same has now elapsed. Solicitor Lucas who was at the meeting, stated he had no alternative but to pay the amount owing.

Selkirk stated the decisions of Mr. Lucas had not always been favorable to him, and that he was advised by two solicitors that where a property was assessed in error that it was open to appeal without the lapse of time being considered.

After some forty-five minutes of dispute, during which Selkirk twice reminded the Clerk that it was possible to recover the taxes in the course of law, Reeve Clark closed the matter by declaring Council was not the proper body to deal with any matter except the tax bill for 1957.

Solicitor Lucas said Mr. Selkirk was stating to Council that he would take any means available to have the Court declare non responsibility for the taxes of 1955 and '56 and at the same time he was asking for an extension of the present agreement.

Council had agreed to the extension but had added several conditions one of which was a new bond. Solicitor Lucas said he wished this as the bond provided on two previous occasions had defaulted. Another condition was that all arrears of taxes were to be paid.

Selkirk claimed that Council only required to extend the period of time and no other conditions should be requested.

Garbage Disposal The Township of Markham Council have been looking for a new place for garbage disposal, an application of Markham Sand & Gravel to utilize the space made by removal of gravel was refused by Metro authority. Mrs. James stated it might be necessary for the township to build a disposal plant, and requested that the committee on sanitation bring in a further report. Cosburn Opposes Ontario Water resources requested Council give third reading to the by-law affecting the water supply. This permits, as far as the Township is concerned, a charge of the cost of installation of mains, etc., against the area in which the installation was made. By-law was given third reading. It is anticipated the Act will be given a revision at next session, making it retroactive to cover one or two areas, but on question by Cosburn Mr. Lucas stated if the Act was not revised, the charge would be
