Plan. Board Confers with Professional Developer

Mr. Oliver Crockford, professional industrial developer and well-known ex-reeve of Scarborough Twp., appeared before Stouffville Planning Board on Thursday evening at the Board's invitation, to discuss the problem of promoting industrial development in Stouffville.

Mr. Crockford who has shown himself to be an expert in matters of promotion and has been engaged to assist a number of municipalities in their development, expressed the view that Stouffville was excellently situated to receive industry and should take immediate steps to publicize its name through various trade channels.

He said that it appeared that the municipality was in need of acquiring additional land for industrial purposes, but that some steps could be taken in the meantime to induce industry to locate on the few parcels of industrial land which remained in town.

Mr. Crockford reviewed some of his experiences in the Township of Scarborough which resulted in this municipality becoming one of the most industrialized sections of the contin-

He said that no special inducements were necessary if the industry was of the right calibre, but on the other hand industry was not to be hoodwinked into "paying through the

nose" for land. Mr. Crockford spent several hours with the local Board and after further study of the local situation he will be in contact | with the Board.
