## Polio Vaccine for Adults

Salk poliomyelitis vaccine is now available free to practising physicians throughout Ontario, according to a reported announcement from the Minister of Health, Dr. Mackinnon Phillips. Polio vaccine is therefore on the same free basis as diphtheria, toxoid, whooping cough vaccine and other similar immunizing material supplied free to practising physicians in Ontario.

Adults under 40 years of age now constitute the more hazardous unprotected group. They are urged to obtain polio vaccination by arrangement with their family doctor before the start of the polio season arrives in May.

York County's M.O.H., Dr. Robert M. King, reported to the Board of Health at its last meeting in 1957 that the Health Unit has given over 63,000 doses of polio vaccine in its pre-school, school and pre-natal immunization programme since the introduction of Salk vaccine in 1955.

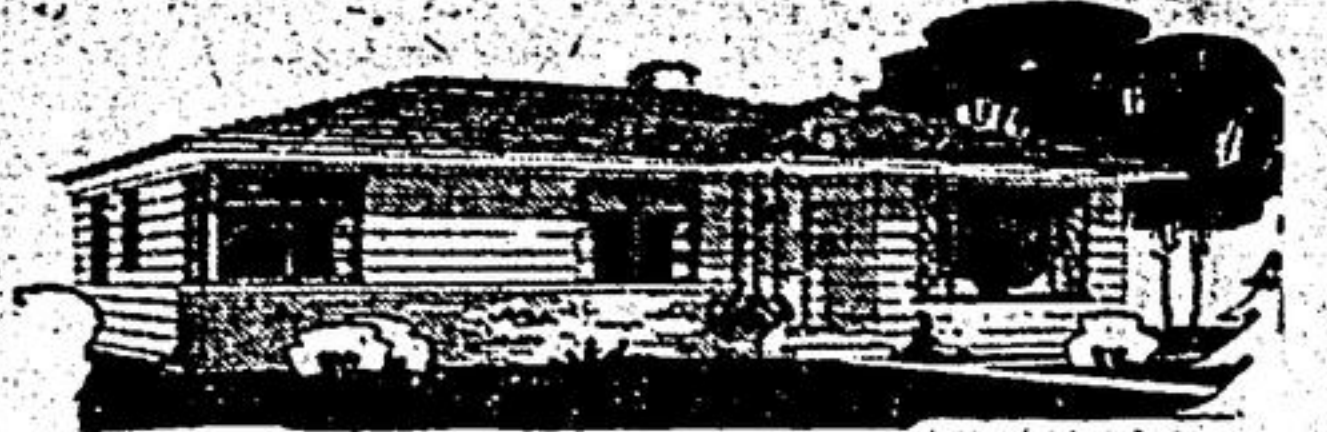
All elementary school children and high school students totalling about 18,000 students have had the opportunity to receive at least two doses and almost all have received three doses as recommended by the Provincial and Federal Health Departments.

The 1958 immunization programme begins this week in schools throughout the county to provide Salk vaccine to new starters or those otherwise in need of initial polio immunization or third doses.

Sixteen special clinics to provide third doses for pre-school children who received first and second doses last spring will
