"Like 9-Yr.-Olds in Reform School" Says Mrs. Wees Of Residents in U.S.S.R.

"I found the people friendly, generous, courteous and anxious to talk to us. I saw no groups of idle teen-agers loitering on street corners. And I believe the people are happy. But they are like a group of nine-year olds in a reform school."

These were among the remarks made by Francis Shelly Wees at the Horticultural meeting on Monday evening of her recent trip to Russia. Dr. and Mrs. Wees make their home a few miles north of Stouffville and Mrs. Wees, who is a noted writer and whose most recent novel "Where Is Jenny Now" is now available at our Public Library, Stouffville, spent 17 days last summer touring, with a party of 26 women and 4 men in the U.S.S.R. She was introduced to the gathering by the new president of the Horticultural Society, Miss Jean Phipper, and she gave to the listeners a most interesting outline of what she had seen in Russia and what she believed to be their meaning.

"What appears to be so at first glance is not always the true picture. You cannot make snap judgments."

"Soviet Russia, a country of 200 million people, with only 7 million belonging to the Communist Party, is a country of human beings, without souls, (so they believe) who work day and night to build the state. There are very few individuals."

It is a country of few functioning churches, although now people are allowed to attend church services. Moscow has, probably, about seven churches holding services. Kiev, the capital city of the Ukraine, has none.

Mrs. Wees spoke of visiting the large state-owned department stores which are crowded with people looking, but not buying of the shoddy junk displayed. Most people cannot af-
