Although the pre-playoff withdrawal of our Juvenile team from further organized hockey competition may have come as a shock to a few faithful followers, to the majority, it was no surprise. There was really no other way out. .

Contrary to reports, no one was at fault. The local management laid their cards on the table before the OMHA Board. All certificates had been properly signed and addressed. Everything was done up and above board.

The Ontario Minor Hockey Association's hands were tied. Stouffville netminder, Bill Asling was a resident of Brooklin and ineligible to play here. The management knew this and in a written letter to the minor league officials, explained the situation in its entirety. They had faint hopes that the Board might grant the club special permission to retain Asling's services, but, of course, this would be setting a very awkward precedent. As a last resort, the Management hoped that they might be raised up into "B" class competition, but this too, was turned down. The Board explained in no uncertain terms that Asling was the property of the closest Juvenile team and could not be retained as Stouffville property under any circumstances. This left the management with no alternative but to fold.

Playing Juvenile hockey without a seasoned goaltender is comparable to a baseball team without a pitcher. It isn't fair to the other players, the management or the fans. The risk in hockey is even greater due to the possibilities of injury which might befall an unqualified goal guardian. This factor too, was taken into consideration. So the Juvenile team joins the Juniors in the ranks of the deceased. Let's hope the disease isn't too contagious.

Juveniles Bow Out With 9-1 Loss To Woodbridge

The hockey season ended prematurely for the Stouffville Juvenile team on Thursday night of last week after they absorbed 2 9-1 loss at the hands of a visiting Woodbridge club.
