

## York Plans Folk School

Most of the criticism of marketing plans comes from people and organizations not directly connected with agriculture. Mr. Clayton Frey, Sarina, a director of the Ontario hog producers marketing board, told the recent annual meeting of York county Hog Producers Association in Newmarket.

Big corporations and influential middlemen are terrified that farmers will become organized and learn to market their own products and thus control their margin of profit, he said.

Farm marketing legislation is now law in Ontario, he said, and a producer shipping his hogs anywhere but to an assembly yard is violating the law just as much as the trucker who hauls them.

If producers want more money for their hogs they must attend meetings of their organization and work more closely together, Benjamin Steers, Bradford, zone representative for the Ont. Hog Producers Association, said.

Mr. Frey invited producers to visit their own sales office in Toronto and see their own organization in operation.

Melvin McMillan, Newmarket, is president of the York county Hog Producers Association for the coming year. Other officers are: Oliver Bales, Sharon, first vice-president; and John Sytema of Newmarket, secretary-treasurer.

Resolutions passed at the meeting included a request for the enforcement of the regulations requiring tattooing of hogs before they are loaded by the transporter and the issuing of bills of lading showing tattoo numbers.

Frank Brumwell, Gormley, Ontario Federation of Agriculture member for York county, attended the annual meeting of the Canadian Federation of Agriculture in Montreal last week.

Plans are already underway for a three-day folk school to be held on March 20-23 for residents of Ontario and York counties. The school will be held at Cherry Hill Farm, Unionville.
