Markham Police Handle 454 Calls in Month

Markham Township Police handled 454 calls last month according to their regular report presented to council on Monday afternoon. The total mileage covered by the cruisers was 10,466 miles at a cost of \$433.26. Total number of summonses issued was 188 with 57 for other municipalities. There were 10 fire calls, 11 for theft and 27 dog complaints.

A resolution by councillors McNeil and Mumberson authorized council to purchase 15 lockers to be installed in the police department. Cost will be \$336.25.

Accounts
Total amount of general accounts passed by council for payment was \$21,535.54 of which \$12,000 relates to payments on the construction of the Cedar Grove and Cashel bridges and a number of substantial accounts for engineering fees.

Agree on Hazel Damage
An agreement has been drawn and a bylaw passed relating to the amount which would be charged to the Village of Unionville and Thornhill in connection with repairing roads and bridges due to damage caused by hurricane Hazel. These villages had previously taken the initial steps to go into court against the township objecting to the charge which last year was 2.6 mills.

Both villages have now agreed to share part of the cost of the bridge repairs, but the township must bear the total cost of roads except those within the village boundaries. The reduction in the charge will reduce the assessment made in this connection to about one mill.

TO STAND TRIAL IN BROUGHAM BLAST CASE
Joseph Pridmore, Brougham, was committed for trial by a judge and jury in police court Friday. Pridmore, 16, is charged with conveying and placing explosives with intent to cause explosion.

Pridmore pleaded not guilty. A second charge of failing to use care in handling dynamite was withdrawn by the crown attorney "without prejudice."

Pridmore was involved in the Hallow'e'en 1957 dynamiting of a Pickering township weigh scale shack, owned by Curran and Briggs, Ltd. The other teenagers received suspended sentences earlier this year.

In the preliminary hearing R. Nichol, engineer for Curran & Briggs, Ltd., gave the amount of damage to the shack as \$650 to the scales and \$1850 to the building.

John Walton, Elizabeth street, Pickering, testified that the dynamite used in the explosion had been brought to the shack in Pridmore's car.

A statement taken from Pridmore on Nov. 23, 1957, at the Whitby OPP detachment office, was admitted in evidence.

Crown Attorney Alex. C. Hall, Q.C., asked that bail for Pridmore be set at \$1000. The charge carries a maximum penalty of life imprisonment.
Ball was set at \$500.

UNIONVILLE WHIPS AURORA 8-3 LEADS PLAYOFFS 2-0

Morris Prozenko's Unionville Juvenile "Jets" took a stranglehold on the first round of the Ontario "B" playoffs by whipping Aurora 8-3 on Friday night. It was the second game in two nights for the rivals. Unionville blanked the Yonge Street squad 6-0 in the playoff opener. The series is a best three out of five games.

In Friday's contest, Unionville looked much the better club. Their precision passing plays caught the Aurora defence flat-footed on a number of occasions.

The game was a nip and tuck battle until the "Jets" broke it wide open with a five goal attack in the final frame. The two teams had been deadlocked at 3-3.

John Pettit and Carl Keffer each potted a pair of goals for the winners. Single tallies came from the sticks of Bruce Holdsworth, Dick Underwood, Al Tidsbury and Ron Graham. Stewart Davidson with two and Joe Dol were the Aurora marksmen.

Carl Keffer was the driving force up front for the Jets. John Pettit also played well and was robbed of at least two goals by the Aurora netminder. Ron Graham turned in a fine performance on the Unionville rearguard. Jim Lott, the Jets' puck-stopper out-guessed a number of Aurora forwards, blocking numerous goal-labelled drives.

Markham's Ron Graham blinked the light at the fifteen minute mark of the first period with Aurora playing a man short. The visitors evened the count at 19:55. Stewart Davidson hitting the target with a long shot.

In the second session, Unionville struck hard and fast. Carl Keffer teed off with a golf shot at 5:10 and Bruce Holdsworth made it 3-1 at 7:05. Aurora's Stewart Davidson kept the Yonge Street squad in the game with his second goal at 18:45. The tally came on a wild scramble around the Unionville net after goalie Lott had blocked two previous shots.

The third period was only minutes old when Aurora deadlocked the score. Joe Dol was the marksman. From that point on, however, it was all Unionville in the goal scoring department. Carl Keffer grabbed a loose puck and fired it into the top corner for what proved to be the winner. Dick Underwood found himself alone inside the Aurora blueline and promptly deposited the puck in the twine with a backhand shot. The two tallies came only six seconds apart. John Pettit with two and Alan Tidsbury completed the rout.

Two ex-Stouffville players, recent recruits with Coach Prozenko's "Jets", Howard Malcolm and Ted Suzuki, took their regular turns. Malcolm performed both on the defence and up front. Jack Shropshire and Geo. Carey officiated.
