

# York County Council Urgently Asked for \$80,000 for Hospital

A request for a grant of \$80,000 was made to York County Council in session at Newmarket on Tuesday by the York County Hospital. Appearing before council to explain the hospital's urgent need for financial assistance were W. A. Speer, chairman of the hospital board of directors and C. A. Cathers, M.P. who chaired the public campaign for funds for the addition to York County Hospital. The request was referred to the finance committee for study and a report back to council.

Mr. Speer told County Council members that \$148,768 is needed to put the hospital in a liquid financial position. This deficit is a result of: deficit in building and equipment fund for the new building, \$53,000; working capital required for which no provision was made at the time of expansion or previous to it, \$70,000; operating losses for five years 1953 to 1957 (excluding depreciation) \$55,800. This amounted to \$178,800, Mr. Speer added. From this was deducted the special grant of \$30,000 given the hospital by York county last year and it left a balance of \$148,000. The capacity of the hospital was increased in 1956 from 55

**MRS. P. BRILLINGER WAS IN 89th YEAR**

On Friday morning, Feb. 7th, Mrs. Peter Brillinger passed away at her home in Gormley following a stroke suffered on Tuesday morning from which she never regained consciousness.

Born on the fifth concession of Whitchurch at Bethesda on June 23rd, 1869, Adeline Shaffer, second daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Shaffer, lived in that community until her marriage to the late Peter Brillinger on February 6th, 1894, and for some years later. Then in the fall of 1913 they bought the farm in Gormley which was known as the Samuel Baker farm. Here they lived and worked together for many years.

Mr. Brillinger predeceased his wife in July, 1955. Mrs. Brillinger was in her 89th year. She is survived by one son Roy, seven grandchildren and one great-grandchild. The funeral service on Sunday afternoon was held in the Heise Hill church. Bishop Alvin Winger conducted the service assisted by Rev. J. H. Steckley of Gormley and Rev. J. H. Heise of Welland. Rev. Roy Nigh of Unionville had charge of the short family service in the home. Interment was in Heise Hill cemetery.
