Mr. Spear told County Council members that \$148,768 is needed to put the hospital in a liquid financial position. This deficit is a result of: deficit in building and equipment fund for the new building, \$53,000; working capital required for which no provision was made at the time of expansion or previous to it, \$70,000; operating losses for five years 1953 to 1957 (excluding depreciation) \$55,800. This amounted to \$178,-800, Mr. Spear added. - From this was deducted the special grant of \$30,000 given the hospital by York county last year and it left a balance of \$148,000.

York County pledged \$300,-000 to the hospital building fund, payable, in yearly instalments of \$60,000 over a five-i year period. Mr. Cathers explained that interest on this, which must be paid by the hospital, will amount to approximately \$45,000 over the 5 years. This must be included in the operating loss.
