York County Cattle Owners Vote "Yes"

During the latter part of February, the cattle owners of York County canvassed their members to ask the Health of Animals Branch of the Canada Dept. of Agriculture to designate the county as a Brucellosis Control Area, as the next step to eradicate contagious abortion in their herds and hold their export market.

The complete returns reported by Agricultural Representative W. M. Cockburn of Newmarket show 90.3% of the cattle owners signed the petitions with the following percentages by township: Georgina 95%, North Gwillimbury 96%, East Gwillimbury 90%, Whitchurch 90%, Markham 91%, King 92%, Vaughan 82% and the rural areas of Metropolitan Toronto 98%.

With Peele's canvass just completed, there will be at least a three county block of Halton, Peel and York with Ontario canvassing now to make it four counties. Blood testing has started in the counties of Prince Edward and Oxford. Mr. Cockburn explains that under this policy all cattle except official vaccinates under 36 months, steers, spayed heifers and calves under 8 months will be blood tested, and any reactors will be marked for slaughter in an inspected plant. The committee is hopeful the test will get underway this spring in this area.
