

Markham Tp. Reeve to Arnprior for C.D.

Reeve W. L. Clark of Markham Township, recently accepted an invitation to visit and inspect the Civil Defence College at Arnprior. Mr. Clark, keenly interested in civil defence, reported an interesting and enlightening day at the college. He was taken on a tour of the college and saw two live demonstrations in the college theatre of the care of evacuees in the event of H-bomb destruction.

Mr. Clark commented on the organization and the skill needed in directing the evacuation of a small town. This involved not only providing transportation to take residents out of the stricken area to safety at least twenty miles away, but the billeting and feeding of the victims.

Inspired by the work of the college, Mr. Clark will sponsor the re-organization of the town-

ship executive committee of the civil defence. The original purchase of the first executive committee, that of setting up civil defence programs in the township, has largely been accomplished and there is need now for a new executive organization to meet new needs.

THIS WEEK'S RECIPE
Old-Fashioned Fruit Salad (Serves 4-6)

2 large oranges
1 large red apple
2 bananas
½ cup walnuts
½ cup heavy cream, whipped
2 tablespoons lemon juice
2 tablespoons sugar

Pare and section oranges. Core and dice unpared apple. Peel and slice bananas. Break walnuts into large pieces. Add lemon juice and sugar to whipped cream. Pour over fruit and walnuts, mixing lightly.

with just enough orange juice and cream cheese to hold together.

Nice sauce for ham loaf uses 1 cup of maple-flavored syrup heated with ¼ cup crushed, drained pineapple.

Skewer together 2-inch squares of bacon, seasoned hamburger, mushroom caps and chicken livers. Broil and serve on heated crusty rolls.

Blend together softened butter and garlic salt, then spread this on very thinly sliced small rye bread and toast until bread curls slightly. These are delicious appetizers.

Drop day-old slices of bread with crusts removed into sweetened condensed milk. Drain and dip in coconut flakes. Toast on lightly greased cookie sheet in a moderate oven for 15 minutes. This makes a wonderful snack or dessert.
