**Four Teams, Markham Township League**

Aurora, Markham, Richmond Hill and Stouffville will comprise the entries in the Markham Twp. softball league this summer. Agincourt has withdrawn their club from the circuit. The schedule will open on May 27. Stouffville will play their home games on Tuesday nights. They will have 2 Thursday home contests on June 12 and July 24.

An entry fee of \$20 must be paid before the first game. The league champion will receive \$60 and the runner-up will get \$40. The semi-finals will be 2 out of 3 series. The finals will be 3 out of 5.

The home team will supply the plate umpire. He will receive \$5.00 per game, payable before the start of the contest. All games will start at 8:15 p.m. with an 8:30 deadline. A team will be fined \$5.00 for default. The league will be governed by

**OASA rules. The final signing date for players was set for July 1st.**

In case of rain, the home team must notify the visiting club by six o'clock. The contest must be replayed in ten days time. If the home umpire cannot attend a game, he must notify the league Secretary, Mr. Wilf Bundy in sufficient time to locate a substitute official.

**Mt. Zion Withdraws From Claremont League**

Mt. Zion, an entry in the Claremont Community League since it was organized six years ago, will not field a club in the group this season. They have been accepted into the South Ontario loop and will play their home games in Brooklin. Both leagues held organization meetings on Thursday night of last week.

News of Mt. Zion's shift was made known to the officials at Claremont later in the evening. Mount Zion were represented by Grant Carson and Murray Jones. It is possible that they may enter the O.A.S.A. ranks as an Intermediate "D" club or revert back to Junior class in the Ontario playdowns. The majority of players in the Mount Zion lineup are still eligible for Junior competition.

To Start May 20th  
The opening games of the

The umpire will check the eligibility of all players when the pre-game lineups are submitted. The official will also decide whether the diamond is suitable for a game.

John Little and Caroline Ogilvy are the Senior Champions at the Stouffville District High School. The competitions were run off on Wednesday, May 7th. Other champions are as follows: Intermediate — Helen Gayman and Norm Hendricks; Junior — Faye Byer and Roger Stover.

John Little collected a total of 10 points. He headed the field in the 220 yd. dash and the 440 yds. He placed second in the 100 yds., and the hop, step and jump. John Almstead was the runner-up with 9 points. He placed first in the discus and shot putt. He was second in the mile race and third in the running broad jump. Bob Stover and Don Bruce each chalked up 8 points. Ron Brillinger collected six.

In the Intermediate boys class Norm Hendricks polled a perfect total of 12 points. He placed first in four events, including the 100 yds., 220 yds., 440 yds., and one mile. Steve Kennedy wasn't far off the pace with a 10 point total. He was first in the high jump and the running broad jump. Gord Burkholder was third with nine points.

Roger Stover equalled Norm Hendricks' record with 4 firsts in four events entered. He topped his class in the 100 yds., running broad jump, 880 yds., and softball throw. The runners-up were Allan Boyd and Murray Miller.
