No Power to License Day Nursery Schools

Solicitor J. D. Lucas has informed the members of Markham Twp. Council that a municipality has no authority to license day nurseries. The matter falls under the complete jurisdiction of the province. Mr. Lucas cited the Day Nurseries Act as provincial legislation covering the operation of a day nursery.

On a motion moved by Deputy reeve Dean and seconded by Councillor Watson, council re-

Farm Buildings Hold Many Hazards

Recent statistical reports show that farmers have a higher accident rate than industrial workers. Many of the accidents are unnecessary.

Dangerous stairways and ladders cause many mishaps in farm buildings. Makeshift stairs should be eliminated. Steps should not be more than seven inches high, and should not be less than ten inches deep and three feet wide. As an extra precaution, handrails should be added. Hay, leaves, and dirt should be kept off stairs. Make sure that the rungs of a ladder being used are tight and strong.

Every year, farmers are seriously injured by falling through open feed chutes. Build trap doors or covered chutes at the edge of the mow, and then hay and straw can be handled safely.

Detailed information on safety practices around farm buildings is available in Ontario Department of Agriculture Circular 236, available at the office of the Agricultural Representative.

York County Hospital

A very generous gift of six hospital beds at a cost of over \$500.00 from the North York Police Association is being given to York County Hospital. Possibly no other group of people have the opportunity to appreciate the service given by the hospital and to co-operate so wholeheartedly in that service where accidents of various kinds are concerned. Through their thoughtfulness an incubator for the nursery was donated last year. Both the incubator and the beds were badly needed and the board are very grateful to the North York Police Association for these kind donations.

Care is being felt in hospital and other circles that some of our citizens are looking upon the forthcoming hospital insurance plan as a cure-all for hospital problems, and that the responsibility of the individual community for its hospital will be greatly lessened, if not ended entirely. Hospital authorities are quick to point out that such is by no means the case. Individual hospitals throughout the province do, and will continue to count very heavily on the active support of their own citizens.

The provincial government, as one hospital official said recently, has become a "friendly partner" with hospitals in providing assistance towards solving problems which cannot be met entirely at the local level. In speaking of this increased participation, spokesmen for the Ontario Hospital Services Commission have gone on record on numerous occasions in pointing out that local hospital aut-

onomy in hospital operation is to be preserved and encouraged.

The hospitals of Ontario have reached a point where the standard of their facilities and quality of care provided rank with the best anywhere. This came about to a large extent through the voluntary effort of hospital boards and local citizens. It is a tribute to their initiative and independence. The fact that the responsibility for hospital operation is still vested in the community means that any expansion of existing facilities remains a voluntary local responsibility. It is in this area where community support is most vital.

There is little doubt that the institution of the hospital insurance plan will result eventually in some increase in demand for hospital services. Here too, the co-operation and assistance of every individual will be necessary to eliminate any possible misuse of available hospital space. Unnecessary use of facilities would prove detrimental to those persons in greater need of active hospital treatment. This places a responsibility on all concerned to ensure that it does not happen.

It is these thoughts which should be given serious consideration by everyone, as York County Hospital celebrates National Hospital Day this week.


