

## Some Top-price Shorthorns For Goodwood Herd

Featuring the fourteenth annual Toronto Area Shorthorn Sale, held at M-H Farms, Milliken, was the keen demand for females. Twenty-nine head made an average price of \$700, with seven head selling at \$1,000 or better, and with a top price of \$2,000.

It is interesting to note that while United States buyers were present from Illinois, Kentucky, Virginia and Tennessee, all of the four-figure prices were paid by Ontario purchasers.

Prominent among these was N. D. Hogg, who is establishing a new Shorthorn herd at Uxbridge. Included among his purchases were three from the herd of S. G. Bennett, Georgetown. One was a daughter, and the others granddaughters, of the Perth (Scotland) Supreme Champion, Calrossie Perfect.

Also included in his purchases were two females consigned by A. C. McDermott, Goodwood and included, at \$1,400, the second high priced animal of the sale, as well as another from this herd at \$1,125.

Price average at this sale was \$159 higher than that of the previous year.

If manufacturers continue for many more years to increase the horsepower of their cars as they have in the past several years, prospective buyers will be asking, "How many gallons to the mile?"

Chief C. Wideman of Markham township police department and Chief Edwards of Stouffville were among 92 chief constables who attended the seventh annual Ontario Chief Constables' Association convention held at Chatham, Ontario, May 21-23 when numerous discussions pertaining to policing methods were held.

Markham police report a quiet weekend, the only incident being a broken plate glass window at the Arnold Farms store, but nothing was reported stolen.

When, starting last Monday, May 26, it became necessary for police to stop all cars in order to lay speeding charges, Chief Wideman said, "Markham township may have to follow Richmond Hill's lead and get radar equipment to catch speeding motorists."

Chief Edwards of Stouffville has pressed for some time the need for radio facilities in the local police cruiser. It is now necessary to use the phone for hurry-up calls.

## Maj. Snively Leaves an Estate of Over \$375,000

Major A. C. Snively who has owned an estate in Whitchurch Township for many years, left an estate of \$375,456, his will revealed this week. Major Snively was an investment dealer and sportsman and was known throughout the township and for his connection with the North York Hunt Club.

Probated in surrogate court, the will names the widow, Edith Wragg Snively; a son, Murray, and the Premier Trust Co. as executors and trustees of the estate.

Major Snively, one of three founders of the University Club, died March 13 in his 78th year at his Heathdale rd. residence.

Prior to his retirement in 1950, he was for 36 years with the Dominion Securities Corp. Ltd., leaving the firm as vice-president. He held directorates with several other companies.

A keen philatelist, Maj. Snively left his stamp collection valued at over \$14,500 to his son, Murray, who also was bequeathed his father's guns, fishing rods and other sports equipment.

Other legacies: To niece Margaret Macchell, \$1,000; niece Joan Griffith, \$1,000; nephew Adam Griffith, \$1,000; granddaughter Robin Dunbar, \$5,000; grandnephew Pamela Dunbar, \$5,000; daughter Elizabeth Dunbar, \$5,000.

Major Snively also directed that 15 acres of his country estate at Whitchurch township go to his daughter; the remainder being retained by his wife until her death, then going to his son.

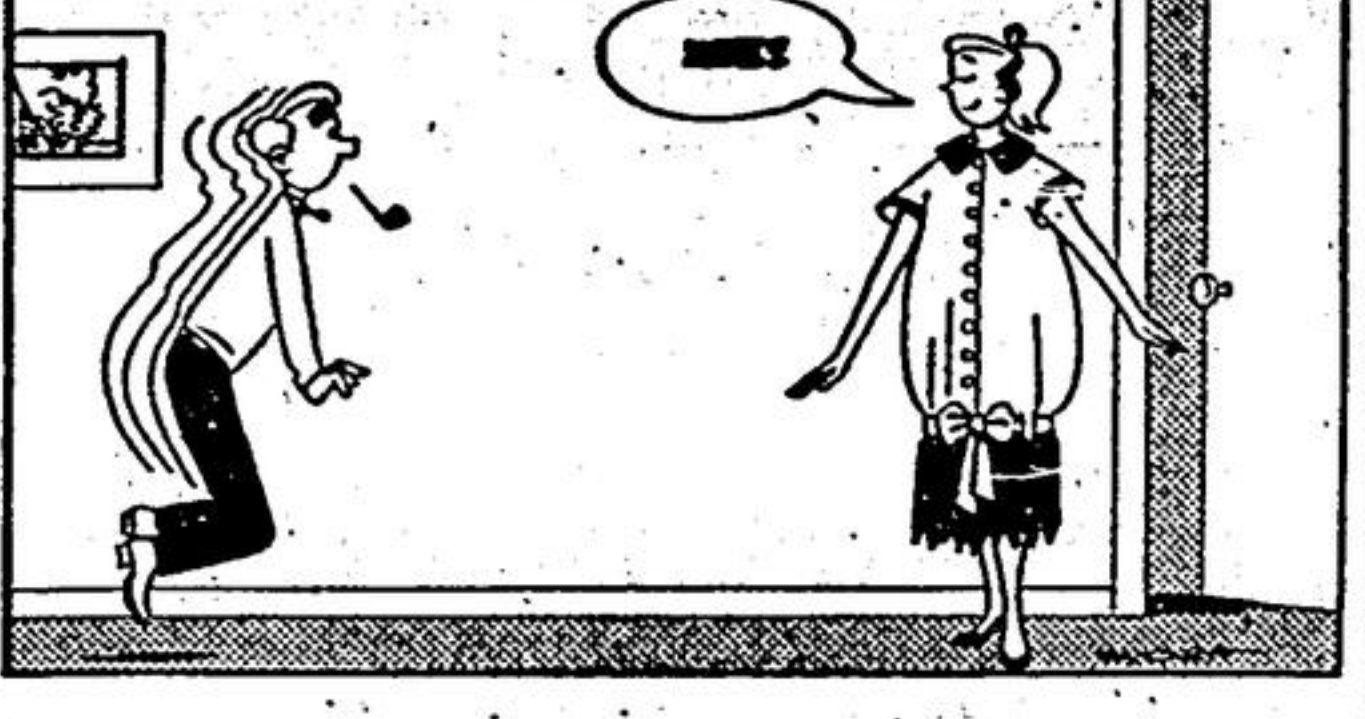
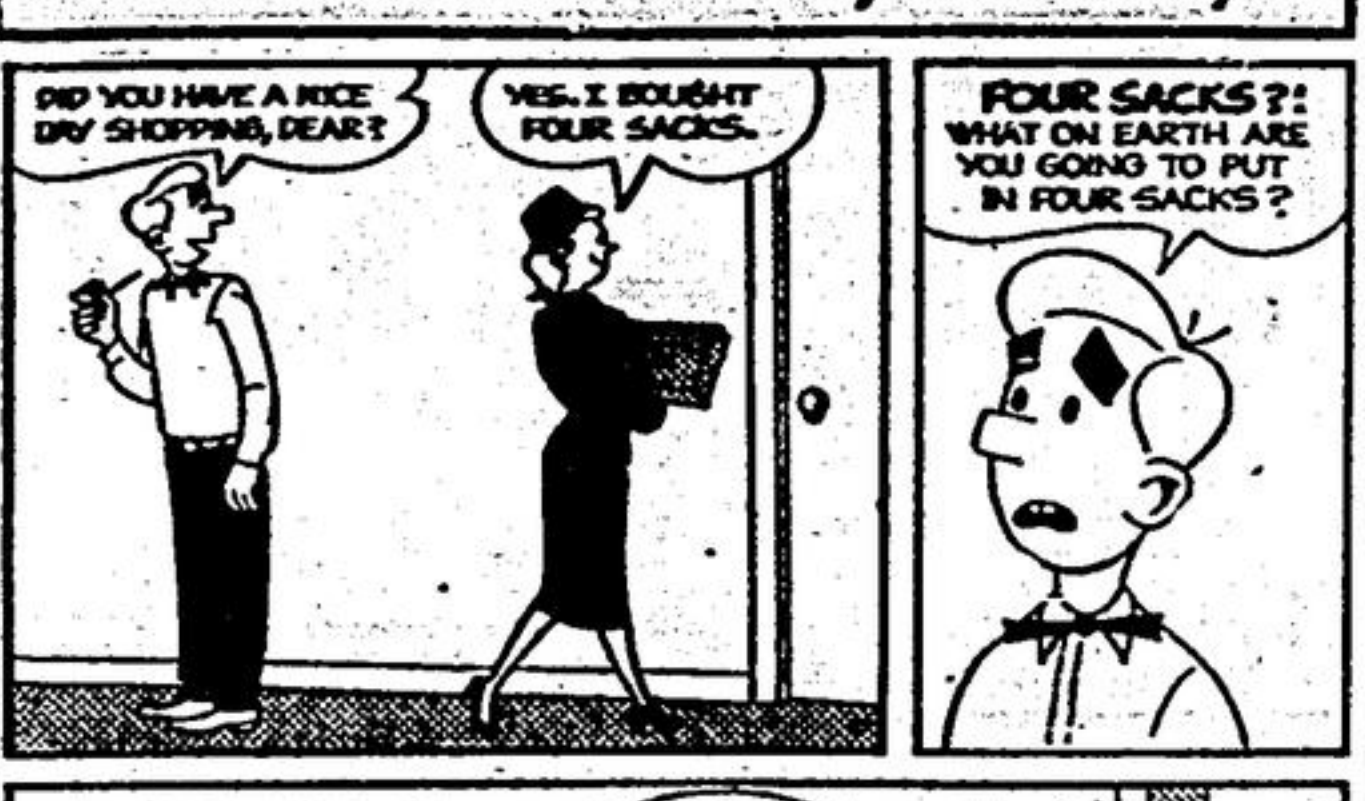
## York County to be Represented at Mayors Convention

## 1958 Ontario Road Work to Hit Record 300 Million Dollars

Newly appointed Ontario Highways Minister F. M. Cass said the province and municipalities will spend an all-time high of \$300,000,000 on roads and streets this year.

Mr. Cass, in his first public speech as highways minister, said at the Ontario Traffic Conference the department's program for the fiscal year 1958-59 will cost \$252,844,000.

Of this amount \$68,935,000 will be paid in subsidies to municipalities.

The department is nearing completion of a study of rural routes and urban streets throughout the province, he said.

The study will give an up-to-date report of both the existing and anticipated needs, so that the legislature and the municipalities can take whatever action is required.

Mr. Cass said he hopes the plan will stimulate "planning by counties and townships, cities and towns because without such planning an adequate and economical road or street system cannot be developed.

He said plans to meet the increasing traffic demands over the next 20 years call for "a great deal of engineering skill, judgment and foresight."
