But even then, the territory won did not equal the territory promised (13:1-6).

There remained "yet very much land to be possessed."
This is a true picture of the Christian life. Conversion is (or ought to be) a great burst of conquest, but it is only a beginning. Even the discovery of the secret of victory does not "fin-ish the job." There are always more areas of conquest calling us on, so we had better not hang up our armor as if all conflict were over.

After conquering the land, "Joshua gave it for an inheritance unto Israel according to their divisions" (11:23). After conquest comes possession, inheritance, enjoyment. Now it is true that some of the tribes were to receive their portion in unconquered territory (13:6), and all of them had enemies to overcome in their allotted inheritance. This also teaches us a spiritual lesson. We walk by faith. We claim spiritual land as our portion in Christ, and we move into it in the assurance that the enemy's hold will be broken. Let us not be afraid to "possess our possessions," even if Anakim stand to bar our way. Joshua's last service was to confirm Israel in the service of Jehovah. There were three rival claimants for their allegiancethe gods of the Chaldeans, among whom their father Abram lived before God called him out; the gods of the Egyptians, in whose land they had sojourned so long; and the gods of the Amorites, in whose land they now-dwelt. But what had any of these gods done for them? They were no gods. But Jehovah was the God of their salvation, and, inspired by the aged Joshua's confession. they too, committed themselves to be servants of the God who brought them out of Egypt.
