If your family likes Strawberry Jam they'll enjoy Strawberry Jelly too. Here's the successful way to make it.

STRAWBERRY JELLY
3 1/2 cups juice (about 2 1/2 quarts ripe berries)
7 1/2 cups (3 1/2 lbs.) sugar
1/2 cup strained lemon juice
1 bottle Certo

To prepare juice. Crush thoroughly about 2 1/2 quarts fully ripe berries. Place in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 3 1/2 cups juice and 1/2 cup lemon juice into a very large saucepan. To make jelly. To the measured juice in saucepan, add 7 1/2 cups sugar and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in Certo. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skin off foam with metal spoon and pour quickly into glass. Cover at once with 1/2 inch hot paraffin. Makes about 11 medium glasses.
