Claims Reeve Erred

Pickering Residents Protest 50 ft. Lots

"It astounds me that the Reeve would take action on his own and not consult either the Planning Board or Council," stated Mr. Al Bannock, spokesman for a delegation of residents of Ridgewood Road, West Rouge. The deputation appeared before Pickering Township Council to protest the issuance of twelve building permits on 50-foot lots in their area. They said that they were anxious that all lots retain a minimum frontage of 60 feet.

Mr. Bannock questioned the legality of the permits since they were okayed solely by the Reeve and without the knowledge of Planning Board or Council.

"Is this legal?" asked the spokesman.

"I'm not a lawyer and am not in a position to answer that," replied Dep. Reeve Sherman Scott. Reeve Lawson was not present.

"Are you going to fight this thing or take it lying down?" questioned Mr. Jack Reid, a member of the delegation.

"We must decide whether it would be practical to take it to court," replied Councillor Robt. Stewart. In a previous court case, the judge allowed the construction of homes on 50 foot lots. Residents in the area wish to appeal the judge's decision.

Clerk Lloyd Johnston read a motion from Planning Board supporting a decision to appeal the case.
