



Threw Bottles on Road Fined \$50 and Costs in Magistrates Court

Magistrate Kelly took a serious view of motorists throwing bottles onto the highway when he fined Gaitino Novelli \$50 and costs when he appeared in court at Vaudorf on Tuesday.

Magistrate Kelly stated that a car might drive into this glass and have a blow out with serious injury resulting to occupants or by being diverted across the highway, cause injury to others.

No Emergency Brake Emanuel Kamosetti, charged with operating a light pickup truck without an emergency brake, was fined \$14 and costs.

Leslie Hunt, the owner, gave evidence that the truck was used in rough sub-division ground so that possibly the brake had been made non-effective by a bumper.

Magistrate Kelly stated that it was for the protection of all that any owner keep his truck in good condition.

Pheasants Released In Markham Township

At present, the sale of non-resident pheasant licenses is restricted in Markham Township to a total of 300. Since the township has increased the number of days for the year's annual "shoot", the number of permits to be issued is expected to be greater.

Five hundred and fifty pheasants have already been released through government sources, and a number are also being raised locally for release later.

Markham Council went on record as endorsing a resolution of the Port Erie Council requesting that the government give local municipalities a better distribution of the fines collected in magistrate's courts.

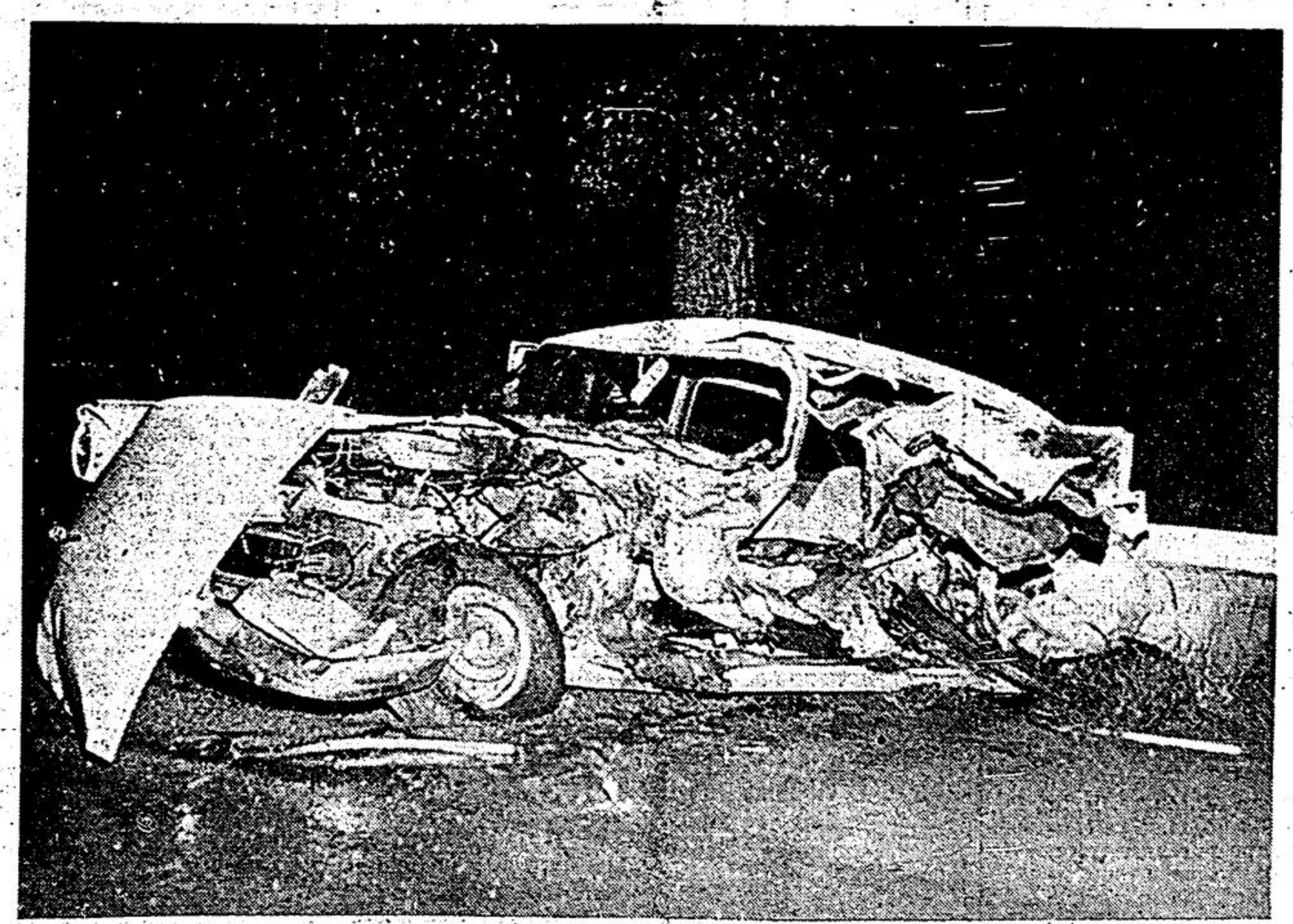
Ballantrae Youth Faces Cattle Rustling Charge

Ronald Charles Baker, 22, of Lot 25, Con. 8, Whitechurch Twp., Ballantrae, was committed for trial by judge and jury on a charge of rustling eight head of Shorthorn cattle.

Baker pleaded not guilty to two charges of theft and possession of the eight head of cattle, the property of Garland Swanick, of Lot 6, Con. 13, Reach Township.

Baker was refused bail. Crown Attorney Alex C. Hall, QC, said that Baker had been on bail on another charge of assault with intent to rob when the rustling offence occurred.

The preliminary hearing, Mr. Swanick told the court that he had missed 12 head of cattle on Thursday, June 5.

William C. Noble, 52, of Gormley, was charged with careless driving by Markham Twp. Police last week, following a serious accident on the 4th concession, south of Victoria Square during the early hours of Friday morning.

Police said that the two cars crashed almost head-on. Both vehicles were thrown into the ditch following the impact. Most seriously injured was the driver of the other auto, 32-year old Karl Juthman of Hamilton.

Juthman was pinned behind the wheel of his wrecked car for a time until he could be released by police and bystanders. The front fender of Noble's car was jammed into the rear seat of Juthman's vehicle.

Dirty Drains Could Stop Markham Road Work

Reeve Clark Declares "I'm sorry that the deputation of ratepayers from Doncaster subdivision has left, as I would like to point out to them that the amount of dirty drainage being put into township roads is deplorable, and I wouldn't blame the road department men if they refused to go in and work in these ditches," declared Reeve Wm. Clark at Markham Twp. council meeting on Monday night.

Representatives from this Yonge St. subdivision had conducted a verbal tirade during the evening against the township rd. department and council in the manner in which its business was conducted.

Mr. Stevens, a ratepayer, commented that certain culverts had not been put in as the ratepayers had recommended, but Reeve Clark replied, "who are we trying to suit here, the ratepayers or the department of highways who are paying 50% of this work."

Mr. Russell, another ratepayer said, "the road department of Markham Twp. should be given a complete revision. There are too many giving orders, one of them countering the other. This township should be able to pay the road foreman enough money that he doesn't have to help unload gravel with a shovel."

Markham Road Supt. Canning said that his men were cleaning up after two other construction companies, and it would be impossible to do anything further until the shoulders of the road and the pipe line depressions had fully settled.

In reply to a question from Markham Twp. council regarding rumours of a proposed new provincial highway through the township, the Department replied that no decision had been reached yet as to the location of the new north-south highway, but that the township council would be kept fully informed when the plans were drawn.

He said that the majority of farmers had their own electric choppers and could do their own work. He noted that many of his customers were long-time residents in the district and had not changed over to the more modern methods.

Two Cows Burned as Fire Destroys Barn On Bruce Clarke Farm

Two milk cows died in a barn fire on the property of Mr. B. Clarke, 6th concession of Whitechurch Twp. on Monday afternoon. The remaining thirty head of registered Holstein cattle were saved.

The blaze started in an upstairs hay mow and within minutes the entire structure was a raging inferno. Spontaneous combustion is believed responsible for the outbreak.

Additional water was supplied by one of Winterstein's trucks. A tank filled with 1,000 gallons aided firemen in combating the blaze. The fire was completely out of control when the Stouffville brigade arrived.

Newmarket Asks \$3,000 for Police Extension

No action was taken by York County council on a request from Newmarket for a grant of \$3,000. The request was made to cover a portion of the cost for the proposed expansion of the police quarters.

Reeve Luck of Newmarket explained that the additional space was required because the town is handling the county's police work. Newmarket considered one-half of the cost should be borne by the county.

The fox was first sighted on the property of Mrs. Howard Jones. Mrs. Jones' three children spotted it in their chicken pen and called their mother. She was surprised when the fox, instead of running away, ran at her.

Train Kills Cyclist On Lake Wilcox Rd.

Vito Costanzo, 17, of Richmond Hill, was killed on Monday night when his motorcycle collided with a CNR freight train at a level crossing on the Lake-Wilcox sideroad, 3 miles south of Vaudorf.

Provincial police said the westbound motorcycle struck the northbound train six cars from the diesel engine. Costanzo was thrown forty feet. His wrecked motorcycle was 100 feet from the crossing.

Police said there are no signals at the crossing, but it is clearly marked by signs and visibility is good.
