

Marriage Cuts Ranks of Home Economists

College-trained home economists are scarce in Canada because most marry shortly after graduation, the ninth International Congress on Home Economics was told at College Park, Md.

Dr. Helen C. Abell of Ottawa, and formerly of Stouffville, submitted a survey of education in home economics in Canada that said: "In 1957 over 1,000 young women were taking university courses in home economics, but most college-trained home economists marry and either cease or temporarily suspend their activities as wage earners; they are employed as teachers, in industry and by the government, and the demand far exceeds the supply."

The report is one of 12 submitted by countries taking part. The congress is attended by one thousand home economists. Surveys review home economics education in connection with social and economic conditions in each country.

The Canadian report said Canadians are marrying earlier, living longer and going to school longer. More women are working and the authority of the male is being replaced by a sharing of family authority and responsibility by the husband and

wife.

In schools, education in the improvement of home and family living is an integral part of the education of Canadian youth.

Home economists, not necessarily with special training, improve Canadian homes and family living through organization like the Canadian Association of Consumer Women's Institutes, home-making clubs, parent-teacher associations and service clubs.

Each province has a home economics service available to educate the public in domestic science.

Facilities were needed for teaching home economists more about their profession, including awards for postgraduate training and research. Summer courses were also needed to teach teachers more about home economics and child care classes should be established for parents, the report noted.

Home economists disseminated information in Canada through the press, radio, television and other publicity.

There is strong evidence that the Canadian home economist is making a contribution toward the improvement of home and family living, the report said.

Parasitic Bronchitis A New Disease In Ontario Cattle

Reports from veterinarians across Southern Ontario indicate that a new disease problem exists in many Ontario herds. The condition is caused by lungworm and it results in a parasitic bronchitis in calves under a year old. Calves which show a pneumonia-like condition but fail to respond to normal treatments for pneumonia are often the first indication that something unusual is causing the trouble.

Affected calves continue to eat well, but steadily lose condition. Usually a soft deep cough which is noticed shortly after the onset of the disease. The Ontario Veterinary College reports that the disease is seasonal, usually beginning its course in August, and running through to mid-November.

The life cycle of the parasite is such that the lungworm affects only calves that have been on pasture. Usually the death rate is very low, but it has run as high as ten per cent in some herds. Calves that are penned indoors for the first year usually will not become affected.

At the present time new drugs for the treatment of parasitic bronchitis are being evaluated.
