The life cycle of the parasite is such that the lungworm affects only calves that have been on pasture. Usually the death rate is very low, but it has run as high as ten per cent in some herds. Calves that are penned indoors for the first year usually will not become affected. At the present time new drugs for the treatment of parasitic bronchitis are being evaluated.
