Mennonite World Council Coming To Canada in 1962, Expect 10,000

Kitchener has been selected as
the site for the next Mennonite
World Conference, to be held
in August, 1962.

Confirmation of the selection,
which was made earlier this
month in Switzerland, was re-
ceived here today by C. J. Rempel.
Mr. Rempel was a delegate
to the last conference, which
was held in Germany.

He said that preparations al-
ready are under way to accom-
modate and look after an esti-
mated 10,000 delegates and vis-
itors.

Kitchener was chosen for the
conference—held every 5 years
—by the general council of the
World Conference at a meeting
at Bienenberg, Switzerland.

The council had been issued
an invitation, on behalf of Kit-
chener, by the six conference
groups, five Mennonite and one
Brethren in Christ, represented
in Ontario.

Dr. Harold S. Bender of Gos-
hens, Ind., conference president,
said a major factor in the deci-
sion to come here was the "ex-
cellent facilities available in the
Kitchener - Waterloo commu-
nity."

In a release confirming the
Kitchener action, Dr. Bender in-
dicated assurance of space for
conference meetings and ade-
quate housing had influenced the
council.

He noted that the Kitchener
Auditorium, seating 7,700, with
parking space for 1,500 cars and
good space for exhibits and
space for feeding a large crowd,
had been booked.

Housing was assured in the
homes of some 3,000 Mennonite
families in the immediate vicini-
ty, as well as in school dormi-
tories, hotels and motels of the
Twin Cities and surrounding
communities.

Further, the three Mennonite
churches in Kitchener have fa-
cilities for sectional meetings,
discussion groups and special
sessions.

Dr. Bender also said that ample
talent for organization and
service in local arrangements is
available.

Winnipeg Mentioned
Mr. Rempel said Winnipeg had
been mentioned as a possible
site but the great amount of
detail on Kitchener provided by
him convinced an all-Canada
meeting of Mennonites in Win-
nipeg last February that Kit-
chener should be offered as the
Canadian site.

A local committee on arrange-
ments for the conference has
been set up. Members are: Bis-
hop J. B. Martin of Waterloo,
chairman; Mr. Rempel, secre-
tary; Jacob Fast of Waterloo,
Rev. Daniel Wagler of Shake-
speare, Elven Shantz, and Bis-
hop E. J. Swaim of Collingwood.

Harold Schmidt of Baden has
been elected treasurer. Mr. Rempel
said the conference in a
normal world condition is ex-
pected to attract 4,000 to Kit-
chener throughout the week-long
sessions and 10,000 for the closing
weekend activities. Official
delegates comprise only 250 of
the total. It is the first time
the World Conference, which
first met in 1926, has been held
in Canada.

ONTARIO HOSPITAL INSURANCE

effective January 1, 1959

On and after January 1, 1959, the Ontario Hospital Services Commission will be the only agency offering standard ward hospital insurance in Ontario. No private insurance company or prepayment plan will offer benefits covering standard ward hospital services after December 31, 1958.

ALL RESIDENTS OF ONTARIO ARE ELIGIBLE
Enrollment is open to every resident of Ontario—regardless of age or physical condition—either through a group, or individually on a Pay-Direct basis.
Non-residents of Ontario are not eligible.

PREMIUMS
The low premiums of \$2.10 a month for a single person and \$4.20 a month for the family (husband, wife and children under age 19) are made possible by extensive financial participation of the Federal and Provincial Governments.

Closing date for Pay-Direct enrollment is September 30th, 1958. (See last question, below)

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Q. How long must a person be a resident of Ontario to become eligible?
A. There is no time-period on residency — all residents are eligible to enroll.

Q. What are the benefits of the plan?
A. The plan pays for the regular and usual standard ward hospital services as available in approved hospitals, for as many days as these services are medically necessary; plus —
Emergency out-patient hospital services within 24 hours following an accident.

Q. Does the plan pay for doctors' bills or surgeons' fees?
A. No.

Q. Will there be any waiting periods for benefits in the case of hospitalization for specific conditions such as maternity cases, repairs of hernias, removal of tonsils, appendicitis, etc.?
A. No. An insured person is eligible for insured services on and after his effective date, regardless of the type of condition requiring care in an approved hospital.

Q. Are there any medical examinations to pass or medical questionnaires to complete prior to enrollment?
A. No.

Q. How does a resident make application for Pay-Direct enrollment?
A. If you will not be registered through a group, complete an application form which you can obtain at a bank or hospital. In communities without a bank the form may be obtained from the post office. Mail the form to the Commission with your cheque or money order for one month's premium. If received on or before September 30, 1958, this payment will cover the three months of January, February and March, 1959. In other words, if you register before the closing date you get two months' free coverage. Subsequent payments will be on a quarterly basis, beginning January 1959.

Q. What areas of additional coverage will be offered by prepayment plans and insurance companies?
A. The private plans and insurance companies will be offering many forms of additional coverage, including payment for the difference in cost between standard ward and semi-private or private hospital accommodation, medical benefits, etc.

Q. Will benefits be provided for hospital care received outside Ontario?
A. Yes. In the event of an insured person being hospitalized in an approved hospital anywhere outside Ontario as the result of a sudden attack of illness, or an accident, reimbursement will be made up to the cost of similar care in a comparable hospital in Ontario.

Q. If I am a resident of Ontario, but work outside the province, am I eligible for benefits?
A. Yes, so long as your recognized residence is in Ontario.

Q. What happens if I do not qualify to enroll in a group and don't enroll as an individual by September 30, 1958?
A. You may enroll at any time BUT you will lose the two months' free coverage, and you will be required to wait three months following date application is received before benefits become available to you. For example: if you do not apply, say, until February you will not have protection until May 1st.

Q. How does a resident make application for Pay-Direct enrollment?
A. If you will not be registered through a group, complete an application form which you can obtain at a bank or hospital. In communities without a bank the form may be obtained from the post office. Mail the form to the Commission with your cheque or money order for one month's premium. If received on or before September 30, 1958, this payment will cover the three months of January, February and March, 1959. In other words, if you register before the closing date you get two months' free coverage. Subsequent payments will be on a quarterly basis, beginning January 1959.
