## Dignitaries To Attend Hospital Opening

The Hon. Michael Starr, Minister of Labour and the Hon. Matthew B. Dymond, Minister of Transport, will be special guests on Sunday at the official opening of the new Uxbridge Cottage Hospital.

The presentation of the key ceremony will be conducted at 3 p.m., Robert J. Harris accepting the key from L. C. Scott Construction Co.

With the official opening on Sunday, a large campaign is being launched for hospital equipment. It is estimated that \$55,000 will be required to complete the hospital equipment, and a concentrated fund-raising campaign will be carried out throughout the area to be served.

In a full-page display advertisement in this issue, the Hospital Board lists those areas to be served by the hospital, and the communities who will be asked to contribute. Many have worked and given considerable effort to make this "hospital dream" come true, and now those residents who will be served by its facilities, are to be asked to help with a contribution to put the worthy project over the top.

## Abandons Assessment Appeal

The Township of Reach has notified officials of Ont. County that it is abandoning its equalized assessment appeal. The appeal was scheduled to go before Judge John E. Pritchard on Oct. 29.

The assessment of Reach was this year raised by \$108,000 at the June session of the County Council on recommendation of County Assessor Gordon Hepditch, who said at that time he felt that the Reach Twp. assessment roll indicated that the township was not assessed according to procedures adopted in other municipalities of the county.

An appeal by the town of Whitby against its equalized assessment is still scheduled to be heard on Oct. 29.

The County Health Unit has recommended that consideration should be given immediately to the construction of a semi-sewer system in the West Rouge. Reeve Wm. Lawson informed Council of the Unit's decision, at the regular meeting on Monday night. The Reeve said that a complete report would be filed for the next meeting on October 20.

A two-man delegation from the West Rouge attended Council on Monday evening. They wished to know what steps had been taken to alleviate their problem.

Deputy Reeve Sherman Scott said that the Health Unit were definitely aware of the matter and immediate action would be taken.

Reeve Lawson explained that eventually a complete sewer system would be installed in the West Rouge. He noted that the cost of such a project was not as high as was first contemplated.
