In view of the fact that meat prices today are somewhere in the stratosphere, it is interesting to note that back in 1932, when the depression was about at its worst, livestock prices were scraping bottom. 1957 initiated the hunter safety training program. Classes will be conducted by certified instructors working in the main through organized sports clubs across the province.

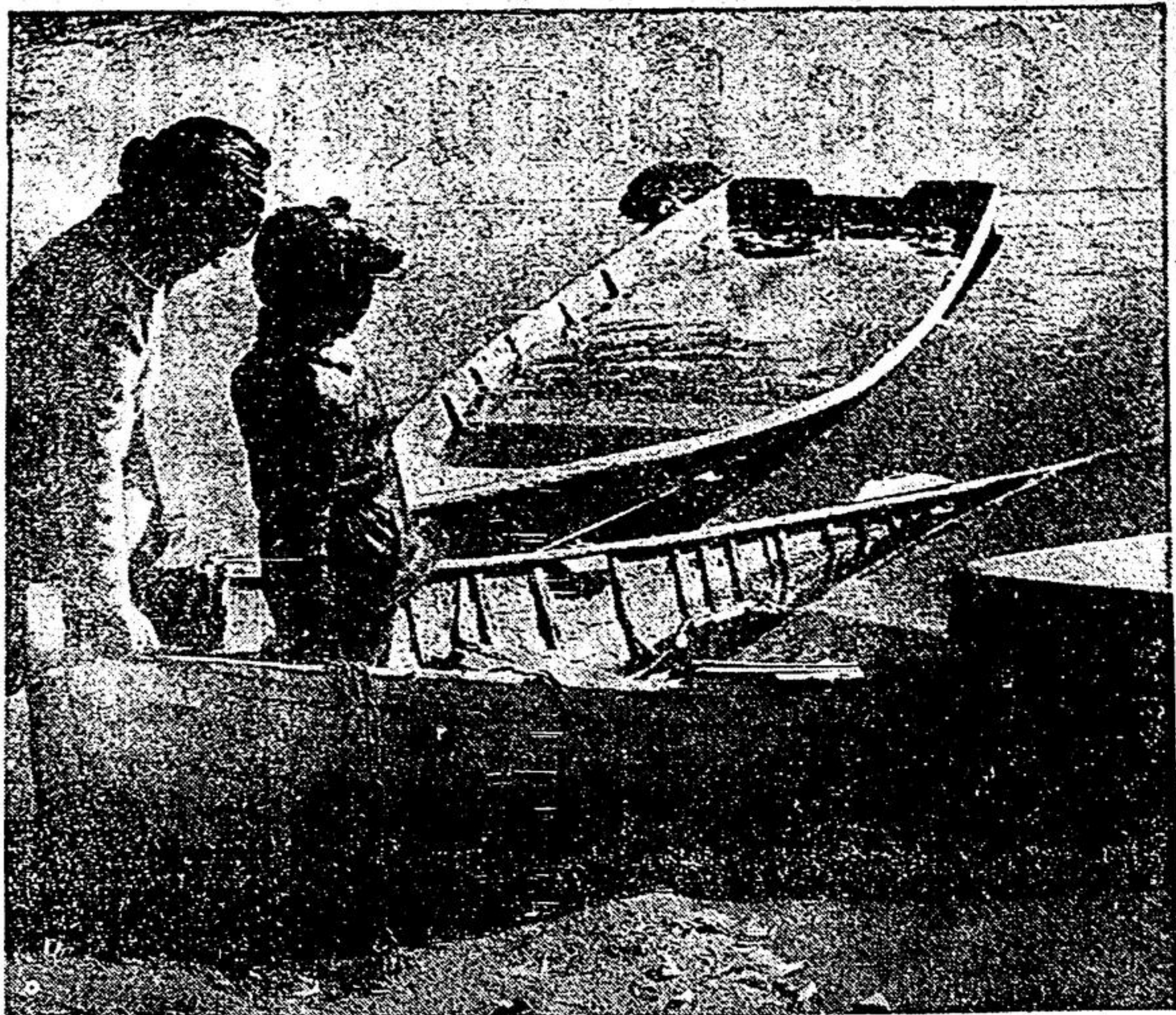

Verse by Verse

Mark 1:34—"After that John was put in prison, Jesus came into Galilee, preaching the Gospel. . . . An interval of nearly a year elapses between Mark 1:13 and 14. The author omits the historical details given in John 1:19 to 4:42.

Verse 15—" . . . The kingdom of God is at hand; repent ye, and believe the gospel." The "time is fulfilled," Gal. 4:4; Eph. 1:10. Prophecies and preparatory events of previous eras now reach their consummation: Messiah has arrived. Himself the King, He announces the advent of the Kingdom, and urges men to enter it through repentance—change of heart and mind—and saving faith.

Verse 16—" . . . He saw Simon and Andrew his brother casting a net into the sea. . . . The Sea of Galilee (about thirteen miles long and six and one half wide) was the scene of much of our Lord's activity. Beside its shores He now calls His first four disciples to service. These men had already acknowledged the Lord (see John 1:40-42);
