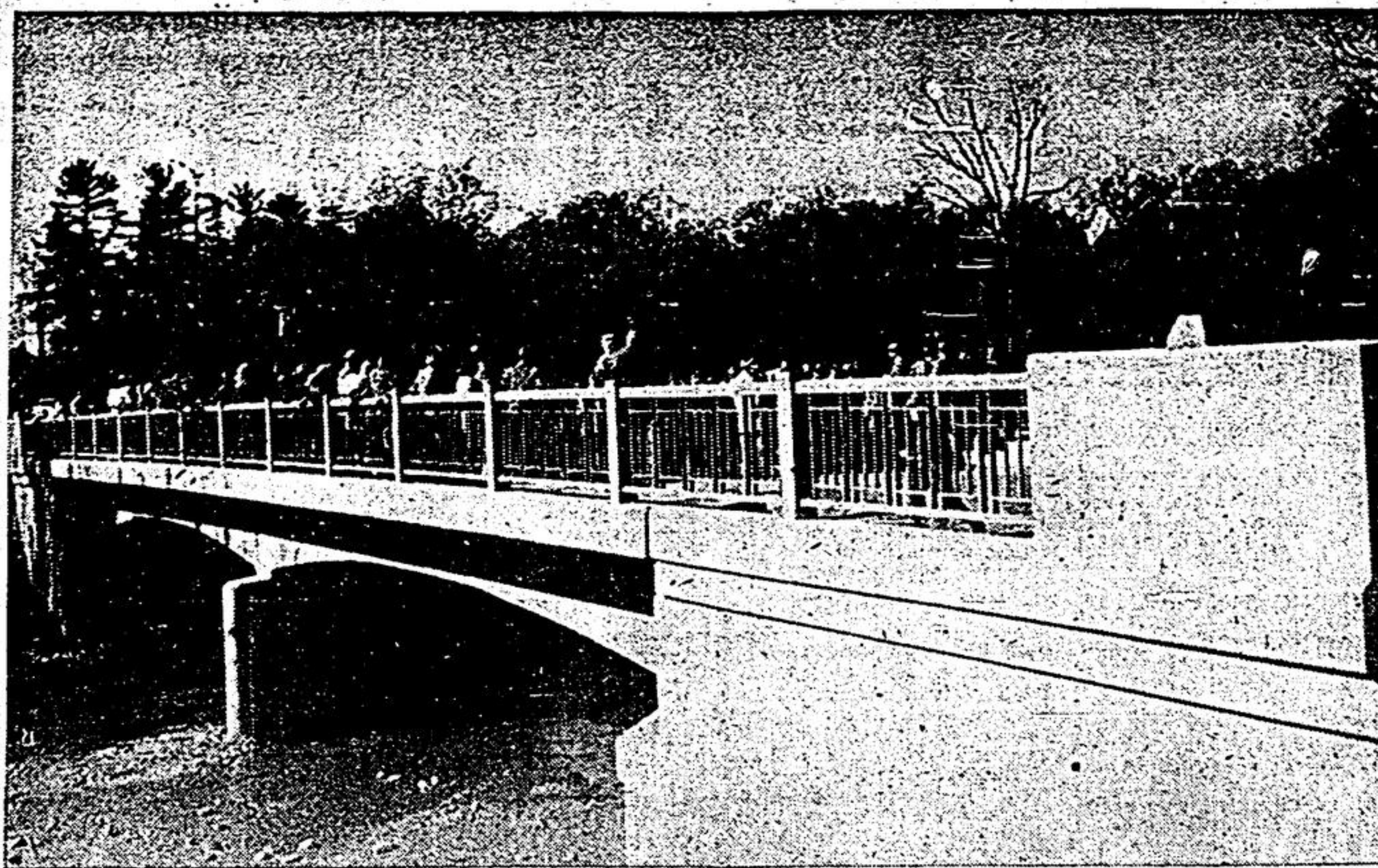
An election will be necessary, no matter what the outcome of the nomination meeting may be, due to a vote on the question of a two year term and will take place on:
