TOWNSHIP of UXBRIDGE BY-LAW NO. 1348

A By-law to amend By-law No. 1223; being a By-law to prohibit the dumping of refuse and waste materials on the highways and streets of the Township of Uxbridge.

WHEREAS it is intended to prohibit the dumping of refuse and waste materials in the Township contrary to the provisions of By-law No. 1223;

AND WHEREAS Council has agreed to impose a fine for the violation of said By-law;

THEREFORE the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Uxbridge enacts as follows, and is hereby enacted:

That By-law No. 1223 Clause 4 be amended to read as follows: "Any person or persons shall be summoned before a magistrate and be liable for a fine of \$50.00 and costs of the court and also the cost of removing the offending material, if not removed previous to court action."

Read three times and passed this 14th day of October, 1958.
