**Horticultural Society
Issues Annual Report**

In reporting on operations of the Society for 1958, your directors are inspired by a measure of satisfaction with the year's achievements. Ten directors meetings were held during the year with an average attendance of fourteen. At these meetings much thought, discussion and planning is entered into concerning the business of the Society. Ten open meetings were held in the United Church basement. All have been well attended, which indicates that you have found them valuable to your Horticultural interests. In the purely local field, the importance of Horticultural education has been emphasized. Among those who have come to us during the year were — Mrs. Francis Shelly Wees—talk on conditions behind the Iron Curtain. Mr. Stalter, Markham, illustrated talk on his trip to the West Indies. Mr. Fred Taylor (from Swift Canadian) presented a film entitled Green Carpet, care of lawns. Dr. Alan Seccord, an illustrated talk on the conservation of wild life. Mr. Don Lewis, demonstration on pruning roses, shrubs and evergreens. Dr. Ives of Stayner, illustrated talk on conservation of wild flowers. Mrs. Bert Jackson, most interesting talk on driftwood. Mr. J. Tiffin of Agincourt, illustrated talk on lily culture. Mr. Carman Lewis of Markham, most interesting talk on his trip to Europe. Mr. Walter Atkinson, illustrated talk on their trip to Moosonee. Rev. Siebert of Almira, guest speaker for tonight. The Society was fortunate in securing capable judges in the person of Mr. Boyd of Richmond Hill, Mr. Tiffin of Agincourt, Mr. Muirhead of Leaside and Mrs. Ruth Banks of Richmond Hill. They commented on the fine quality and excellent arrangements. For music — a thank-you to Melville Male Quartet, Mr. Howard Baker, Aurora Harmonica Band, Earle Hoover family, Mrs. Alliston and Mr. Rutledge, Nancy Murphy, Elaine and Mr. F. Forsythe, Duet—Miss Moss and Jones, Mrs. Alice Ham. The Society is pleased to report an increase in membership over last year's 228, to 315 this year. The spring, summer and autumn flower shows were regarded as successful beyond expectation when we consider the dry summer. There were five flower shows with a total of 1,000 entries, with 53 exhibitors. The Society would welcome more members to enter exhibits at these shows. Total premiums, 1,000 glad-bulbs, 1,300 fall bulbs and vouchers. The children were more interested in making Posters—there were 18 entries. Three bird houses were built by the boys. In March there was a display of flowering house plant bulbs with a panel discussion on plant culture. In April, the anniversary meeting featured a show of hobbies, paintings, rugs, driftwood, shell work, needlepoint. Other shows were as follows—tulip & daffodil, Iris and peony, the delphinium, rose, lily show was a joint meeting of Markham, Mt. Albert and our local society. Prizes for entries were flower containers which created considerable interest. Chrysanthemum show — fall bulbs were given for entries. A number from the local Society visited Aurora and enjoyed a demonstration of floral arrangements. A number of entries were placed in the Oriole garden Centre flower show, and we are pleased to report that these ladies won several prizes. A few of the members were invited to Brooklin, Markham and Mount Albert to judge their flower shows. A delegation from this society attended the Annual Convention at Hamilton and report a splendid program and the district convention was held in town in the Masonic Hall with a record attendance, the first time every society was represented. Two bus loads of members and friends enjoyed a trip to Elora where they visited the Iris and Peony garden of Mr. Brown and on their return spent an enjoyable time in High Park. The Society arranged for replanting of the grounds at the Library with new evergreens and fall bulbs. They also took care of the Station property, keeping grass cut. To the Humber Valley bulb garden the Society donated \$35 for the purchase of 1,000 tulip bulbs. The Society lost a very valued member in the passing of the late Mr. A. E. Miller, past president. His place cannot easily be filled, and he will long be remembered by this Society. We also sincerely appreciate the generosity of Rev. Davis and the United Church board for the accommodation so graciously provided for our meetings and flower shows; to the caretaker for his co-operation, and to our President, Miss Jean Pipher and Secretary, Miss M. Mertens for their continued faithful work. The executive wish to have your continued support and interest to keep up the good work. **Officer Struck
With Own Gun**

Two men were arrested last week after a Markham Township policeman was struck on the head with his own revolver. Harry Malcolm Walsh of Hiawatha Rd., Toronto, was charged with obstructing police and resisting arrest. John Harris of R.R. 1, Milliken, was charged with obstructing police and common assault. Constable Robert Hood said he was patrolling Don Mills Rd. south of No. 7 Highway when he saw a truck unloading septic tank refuse on Harris' property. He told the driver there was a bylaw prohibiting the dumping of refuse in the township. There was a quarrel, during which a second man ordered the constable off the property. P.C. Hood returned to the Don Mills Road and stopped the truck when it left the Harris property. The driver refused to produce his license. He was then attacked by Harris who pulled the officer's gun from his holster and hit him over the head. Constable Hood broke free and radioed for assistance. Sgt. Harvey Cox rushed to the scene and arrested both Walsh and Harris. They will appear in Newmarket Court on Friday, Nov. 28.
