S-I-R, is a noun containing only three letters but in my minor hockey vocabulary, it packs more punch than any other word in my much-used 158 page Webster. Anyone who has ever handled the coaching duties of a Peewee, Bantam or even a Midget entry, knows that when he enters the dressing room, he is the recipient of various remarks and greetings. Nothing impresses me more than to hear a Coach addressed as "Sir" by his young proteges. I would automatioally select such a lad as a boy with above-average character and intelligence. It is quite possible that his same gentlemanly conduct would be apparent on the ice, at school or in his home.

Respect of parents, teachers and coaches is best shown through the use of this small, but important three-letter word. It creates a lasting impression on elders and superiors. Although the majority of grown-ups do not expect such politeness from our young people. I believe it is appreciated. It is really, very little to ask.

Recently, while returning home, I offered a ride to a young High School boy who was hitch-hiking at the westerly ilmits of town. I later learned that he was travelling much farther than my planned route. After driving about a mile, I stopped. "Thank you very much, Sir," he said. To me, the boy's character was revealed in that one brief remark.

SHOULD GET TOGETHER

Stouffville's chances of winning an O.M.H.A. Midget. "C" Championship this year are rather slim, due to a ridiculous situation that exists here. At the present time, our town has two entries, one in the North York circuit and another operating under the Lions banner. Together, I believe that we could ice a Provincial champion, but separated, it is unlikely that either club will advance too far along the playoff route. Who should ice the ONE Stouffville Midget club? I don't really know, nor do I really care. I do know this, however, that divided, we cannot stand.

I do not wish to open up an old sore, but to me, the situation is regrettable. Good Midget-age players are not that plentiful in Stouffville. Perhaps, if the boys hang up their togs at mid-season, the separated parties will wish they had given the matter more unbiased consideration. The result of the whole schmozzle could be that Stouffville will play Stouffville in the first round of the Ontario playoffs. I cannot think of anything more absurd. Our North York entry must, of course, knock off both Woodbridge, King City and Sutton in order to advance into Provincial competition. The Lions team has a bye into the Ontario Playoffs.

Even if some reconciliation is made, it is possible that it is now too late to combine our talents. If this is so, then there's little anyone can do. Let it be hoped that such a dilemma shall not occur again.

Last winter he took over the coaching duties of our Bantam entry and before the amazed eyes of every hockey enthusiast, he carried the club into the Ontario finals.
