County Committee Continue Study Of Area For Garbage Disposal

A special committee, set up this year to study the problem of garbage disposal within York County, will continue to function in 1959. Reeve Joseph Fry of Markham village will remain as chairman.

A progress report on the advisability of building one or more incinerators as a county project was made at the November session of county council.

First, the committee contacted all municipalities within the county to determine if they were interested in participating in a co-operative scheme for garbage disposal. Provided the cost was not excessive, all but four approved of the plan. Not interested in a county incinerator program were: Sutton and the townships of East and North Gwillimbury and Georgina.

Second, a questionnaire was circulated. This determined the actual problem in each municipality and the existing methods for garbage disposal. The replies indicated that although the problem is general throughout the county, it is local in nature.

All towns and villages have regular municipal collections. Townships depend on private arrangements with contractors for garbage collection, only in the more densely populated areas.

Townships were asked if incineration facilities were supplied in York county, would they extend the service. In all cases, the committee was informed that no additional service would be provided for the present.

Approximately 350 tons of garbage is collected weekly throughout the county. This figure, varying only with the growth of existing communities, could be expected to remain a constant figure.

No technical investigation of

the questionnaire results has been made to date. No estimates of the cost of various disposal schemes were available, the committee reported. Because of the small amount of material to be disposed of, a single unit would be adequate to handle the incineration. But due to the large area over which it is collected, haulage costs would be prohibitive.

Two Proposals—
Two proposals were made for consideration by municipal representatives. Several incinerators could be located strategically to serve a group of more densely populated communities. Sanitary land-fill operations might be adopted.

In 1956, Markham township obtained estimates from a consulting engineer on a small incineration unit. A unit, to handle the requirements of a population of 12,000, would cost approximately \$55,000 to build. The annual operating cost, including collection in a limited area, was estimated at \$40,000.

Other information presented by the committee concerned the construction of a single unit with capacity of 350 tons per week on an eight-hour per day basis. By including storage space and eventually operating on a 24-hour basis, the capacity of such a unit could be extended to approximately 200 tons per day. Such an installation would cost approximately \$500,000, based on recent work done in Kitchener and Forest Hill, the committee stated.

No estimates were given for the cost of sanitary land-fill operations. They depend upon the sites chosen and the size and capacity of each site.

The committee was congratulated on its progress report. It was instructed to continue its study of the problem.

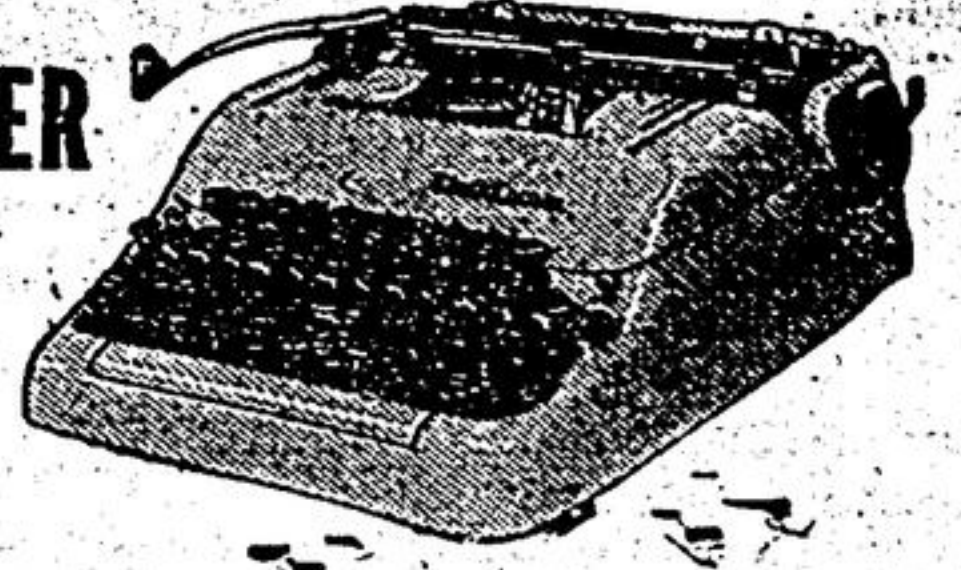
