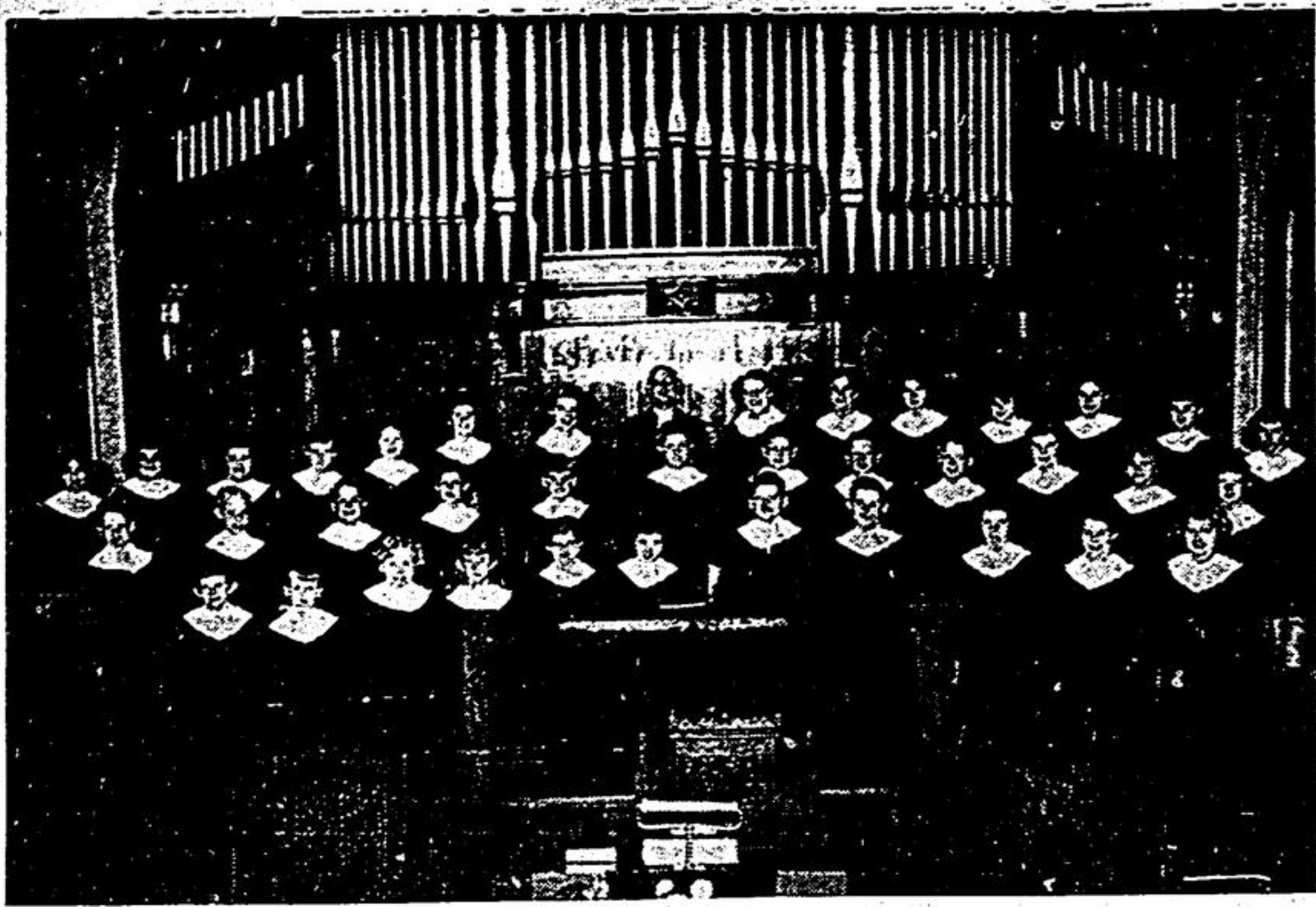

Mrs. Nelson Ion, associate editor of the Newmarket Era and Express, won an acclamation as deputy-reeve of Newmarket in her first try for municipal council. She has been a member of the public school board for the past two years.

Mrs. Ion is the mother of two sons, Ted 15, and Ricky 8. She joined the Era and Express staff in 1947, coming with her husband to Newmarket the previous year.

Mrs. Ion was educated at the Halifax academy and Dalhousie university. She is a member of St. Paul's Chancel guild and leader of two teenage girls' groups at the church. She is an executive member of York Curling club, Ladies' section, a charter member of the Newmarket and District association for Retarded Children and York County Hospital W.A.

Mrs. Ion is past president of the Alexander Muir Home and School and the Newmarket Horticultural Society. She edited the York-Simcoe Home and School magazine for one year and assisted in the re-organization of guides and brownies in Newmarket, serving both as guide captain and District Guide commissioner.

Since 1952 Caroline Ion has covered the council and school board activities for the Era and Express, the Richmond Hill Liberal and Stouffville Tribune. She has not missed a meeting of York County council since it moved to Newmarket in 1954 and attended sessions at the old County building, Adelaide Street.

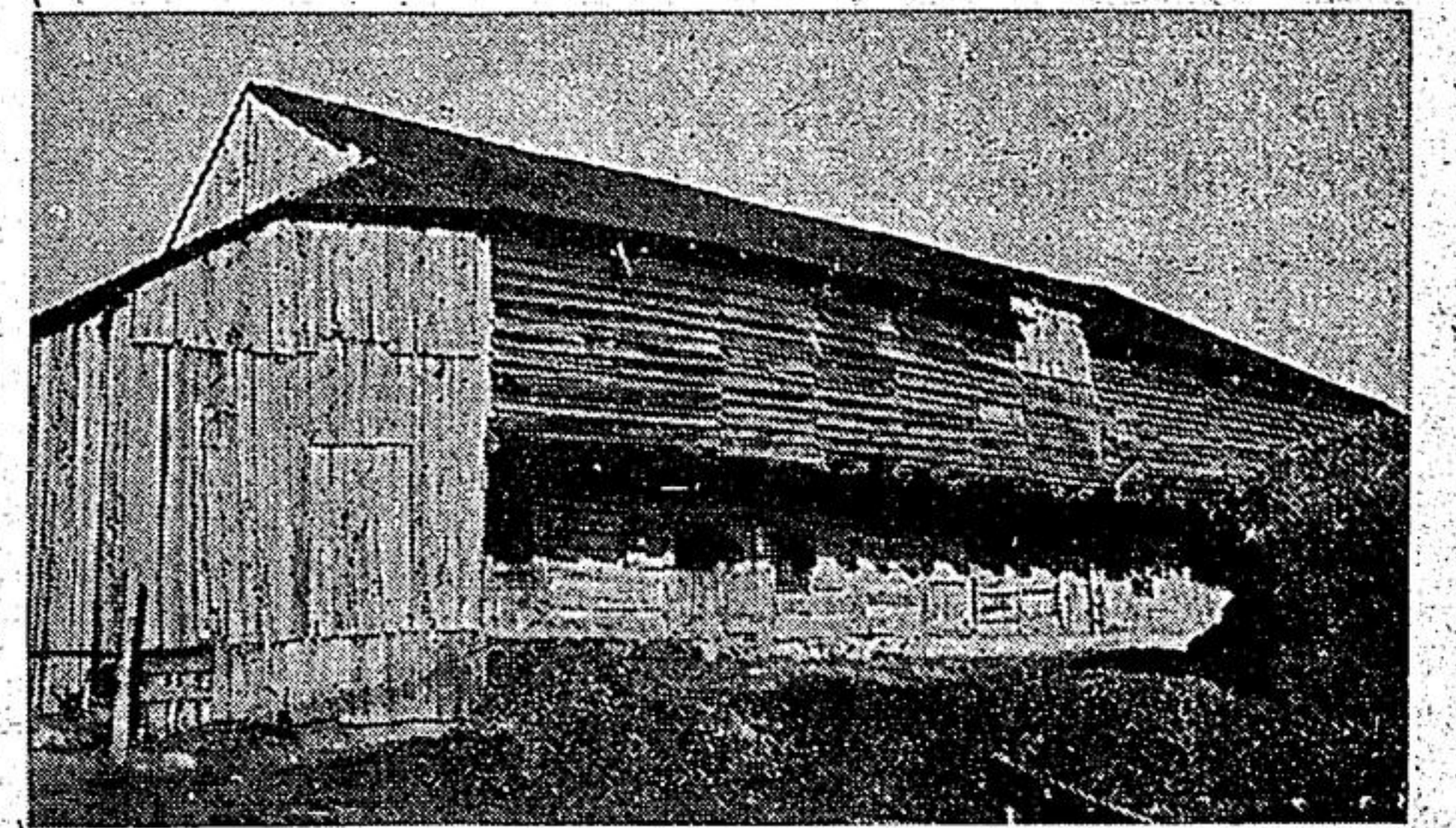
Come and enjoy the Christmas story in picture and song at Stouffville Memorial Christian Church on Sunday evening, Dec. 21, at 7.30.

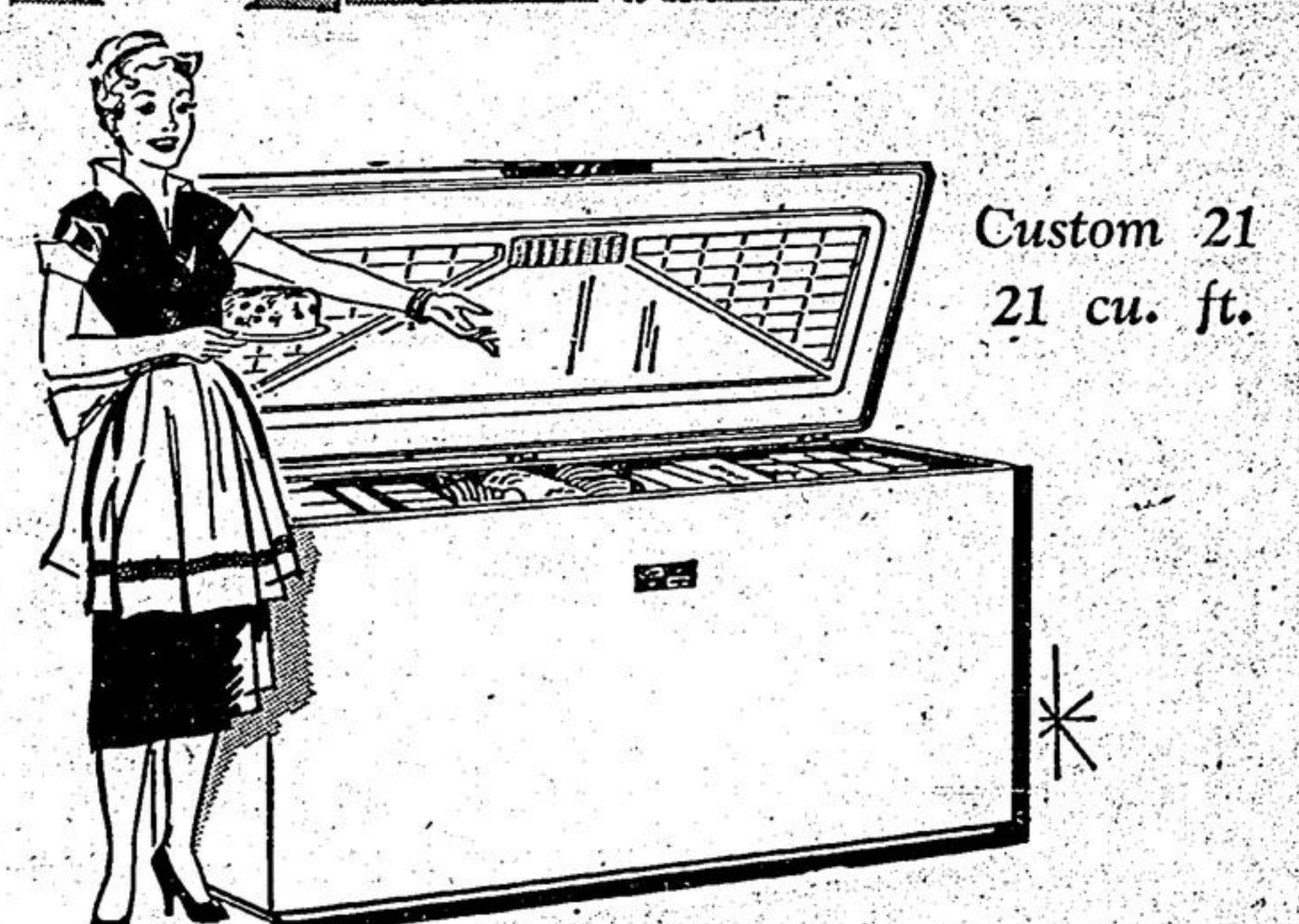

This 145 year old log barn is believed to be the oldest structure of its kind in York County. Located on the farm of Mr. Percy Puterbaugh, lot 13, conc. 5, Vaughan Township, the barn is still in use and in good repair. Six generations of the Puterbaugh family have lived on the property.

John Puterbaugh who married Catharine VanBuskirk, bought this woodland in 1813 from Mrs. Allen who obtained it from the farm 1811-1812. She handed over the Crown Deed which is still in the Puterbaugh possession.

John and Catharine Puterbaugh had 13 children. They cleared the land and built the first log house and barn. The log barn is still in use and in good repair.
