HERE'S HOW TO SELECT A TREE

"How can we select a Christmas tree that holds its needles?" is a question fathers and mothers ask year after year.

The answer depends on the type of tree you buy and the care you give it once you set it up.

All trees tend to drop their leaves after they are cut and stored in a dry room. But some kinds naturally hold their needles longer than others.

Trees used most commonly on Christmas are the spruce, fir, hemlock, pine and red cedars.

Spruce are the first to shed their needles. A spruce can be identified by grasping a branch tightly. Its sharp needles will prick your hand.

The ideal Christmas tree is the fir. It resembles the spruce except that its needles are not sharp. The needles stay on the tree for a long time, and become a golden brown before they finally drop off. Needles of the Douglas fir are flat and soft to the touch. This popular tree can be easily identified by examining the cones which have small appendages on each side.

Fines have never been very popular as Christmas trees, in spite of the fact that they do not shed their needles easily. This is most likely due to their unsymmetrical appearance that does not closely resemble the traditional Christmas tree.

No matter what kind of Christmas tree you select, it will hold its needles longer if it is standing in water. Place a little water in the base of your tree stand and you will be bothered less with falling needles than you were last year.

Train Changes Route

Canadian National Railways' Super Continental, formerly running on the CNR line east of Lake Simcoe via Richmond Hill, was re-routed to the west side of the lake commencing December 7.

The luxury passenger train will run between Toronto and Washago via Newmarket, Barrie and Orillia. Its new route entering and leaving Toronto will enable it to serve a more heavily populated area.

Travellers from Richmond Hill, however, will still have a good connection with the fast train through CNR's Toronto-North Bay train, The Northland.

The Northland leaves Toronto at 5:30 p.m., reaches Richmond Hill at 6:10 p.m., Washago at 7:50 p.m. Passengers from Richmond Hill may board this train for connections with the Super Continental at Washago at 8:35 p.m.

On the new schedule the Super Continental will leave Toronto at 6:10 p.m., five minutes earlier than at present, and arrive in Vancouver 20 minutes earlier, a 15-minute running time improvement.

The Continental Limited also uses the Barrie route on its westbound run, and will begin leaving Toronto at 11:30 p.m. daily in stead of the present 11 p.m.

It will continue using the Beaverton-Richmond Hill line on its eastbound run into Toronto, but on December 7 began arriving at 7:30 a.m. instead of the present 7 a.m.

This train will stop on signal at any station between South Parry and Toronto to detain passengers from Longlac and beyond.

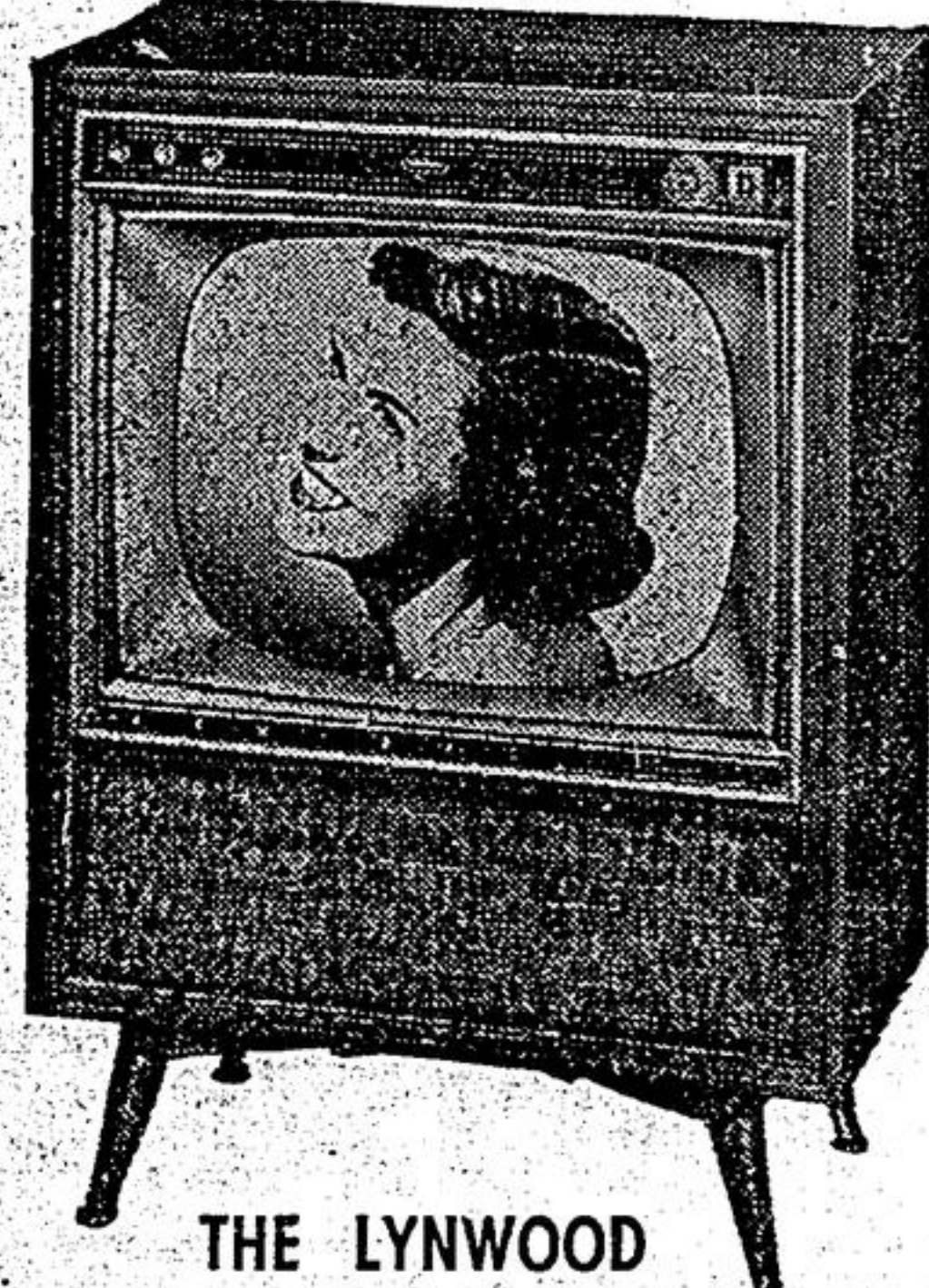
