**Supreme Court Upholds Hog Marketing Plan**

All Ontario farmers must sell their hogs through agencies designated by the Farm Products Marketing Board, 5 judges of the Supreme Court of Ontario ruled Friday.

The court quashed a prohibition order granted in July by Mr. Justice Ferguson, barring Chatham magistrate's court from hearing charges against a Blenheim hog drover.

The court accepted Justice Ferguson's view that a hog marketing scheme set up in 1937 was never valid in law but ruled that the regulations of a 1949 marketing scheme still apply.

The Supreme Court's action clears the way for Ontario Hog Producers' Association Co-operative to proceed with its prosecution of the drover, Clarence Knights, before the Chatham magistrate.

The action was started against Clarence and his brother, Gordon but Gordon died May 21.

Magistrate F. K. Aspersen had acquitted the brothers on 11 charges and threw out another 10. There were 27 others pending when their attorney, B. J. Mackinnon of Toronto, applied for the prohibition order.

These involved contraventions of federal and provincial farm products marketing regulations. Under the provincial regulations a fine of \$50 can be imposed for a first offense and a

**County To Elect Warden January 20**

On Jan. 20 the members of the Ontario County Council will meet at 2 p.m. to elect their warden for 1959. To date, only three members of the council have indicated that they will seek the wardenship. They are — Reeve Walter Beach of East Whitty Twp., Reeve Anson Gerrow of Scugog Twp., and Reeve John Mills, of Ajax.

Seven new faces will appear around the council chamber, including a second lady deputy-reeve. This year Deputy-reeve Mrs. Jean McPherson of Pickering Twp., will attend along with Deputy-reeve Mrs. Mary Reid, of Ajax, who was a member last year.

This year there will be 29 members, one more than last year. For the first time in history, the town of Uxbridge will send a deputy-reeve.

The councillors will cast a total of 37 votes, certain municipalities having more than one vote. Ajax Deputy-reeve Reid will this year have two votes. Others having 2 votes are Reeve John Mills of Ajax, Reeve Kenneth Lee and Deputy-reeve Everett Quantill of Whitty; Reeve Patrick Duff of Mara Twp.; Reeve William Heron, of Whitty Twp.; Reeve Sherman Scott and Deputy-reeve McPherson, of Pickering Twp.

**Holstein Club Annual Meeting Well Attended**

The Annual Meeting of the Ontario County Holstein Club was held in the township Hall, Manchester, on Thursday, Jan. 8th, 1959, with around 100 Holstein breeders in attendance.

President, Harold A. Werry, opened the meeting at 10.45 a.m. In his opening address, Mr. Werry gave a detailed summary of the projects carried out by the club during 1958.

Mr. Jack Fraser, prominent Holstein breeder from Streetsville, Ont., was the guest speaker. He gave a very splendid address on the topic "What Can We Expect In A Holstein Breeder?" He emphasized the importance of good cow families in the breeding program. He emphasized that good farming and good cattle go hand in hand. In his cropping program he pointed out that good hay and pasture were very important. His address was very timely and contained some very worthwhile information.

Mr. Werry thanked Mr. Fraser on behalf of the meeting for his splendid and informative address.

The various projects carried out during the year were discussed and it was decided to sponsor the following projects for 1959: Two Bus Trips, Twilight Meeting, Banquet, Black & Blue Show, and Top of Holstein show. Mr. Chas. Hadden was appointed to represent Ontario County on the East Central Show and Extension Committee.

Mr. Gerry Nelson, Fieldman for the Holstein-Friesian Association, gave a detailed report on his work. He congratulated exhibitors from Ontario County on their splendid success in the show ring at the Championship Show, Peterborough and at the Royal Winter Fair.

He presented Long Time Production certificates to — (Blue Seal) to C. Werry & Son, Smith Bros., George McLaughlin, Orban Chambers; (Red Seal) to G. McLaughlin, Murray Holtby, R. Ormiston, Harold Werry, Bob Fleet, W. Teedy & Sons.

George McLaughlin, National Director, gave an interesting report on the work of the National Association. He reported that the Annual Holstein meeting will be held in the Royal York Hotel, Toronto, on Wednesday, January 28th. He reported that 1958 registrations of Holstein cattle were up 4.4%, transfers were up 5%, and new memberships were up 7%. He also reported that exports of Holstein cattle to the United States were up slightly over 13%. Exports to some other foreign countries were down to some extent. The over-all gain in exports during 1958 was 12.5%.

Jas T. Brown, Newcastle, and Roy Barker, Woodbridge, National Directors; Carlos Tamblin, Durham County and Jim McCague, Simcoe County, spoke briefly.

**Union Again Requests Ottawa Rabies Aid**

The Ontario Farmers Union says it plans to approach the federal government again to seek restitution for farm animals which die after being bitten by rabid foxes.

Gordon Hill, president of the 20,000-member union, said in an interview that Ottawa aid earlier last year brought no action.

He said the union made a direct approach to Agriculture Minister Harkness early in November and it received a letter from Deputy Minister J. G. Taggart saying rabies "does not fall within the field for which federal compensation is provided."

"We haven't given up on this," Mr. Hill said. "We feel we have a good case and will make further representations."

Dr. Glenn Collacutt, federal veterinarian, estimated that 747 head of cattle as well as 114 other farm animals have died as a result of rabies in Ontario since last April 1.

But Mr. Hill estimated the number of animals dead as a result of rabies at closer to one thousand.

"Many farmers don't bother to notify the authorities anymore," he said. "They know all that will happen is their herd will be quarantined and the dis-
